Though not everyone signed or had a chance to sign the Attendance Register, at a rough count there were over fifty people there, which was and is most encouraging. Business was fairly brisk, and the main discussion lay around the question of the Roads Used as Public Paths (RUPPS) and the Byways open to all traffic (BOATS). It seems as if the whole of England is up arms against such a threat to the status quo. The Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) is working with people on this matter, and it is necessary to write to our M.P. The matter is being addressed by the Alkham Parish Council, and it will be one of the Society's ongoing tasks; we will keep in contact on the issue (welcome back Sue as Parish Clerk..!). We had 'two intruders' as they called themselves, Mrs Harcourt and Mrs Hewitt though we did not think of them as such! They had arrived with an impressive petition against both the RUPP's and the BOATs which affects many people living in the uplands and out of the way places. Many of us present signed. It was backed by formidable research on the subject. The Treasurer reported a respectable balance, largely boosted this year by the President's party raffle and his generosity. Subscriptions will not increase from the present £1 per person (since 1987, raised from 25p), but many people made donations (rubber bands discarded by postmen will be used instead of envelopes on hand deliveries when necessary .Sec). Three new members were elected to the Committee: John Jackson (Ellinge), Lindsay Bennett (Ewell Minnis) and Raye Luckhurst (South Alkham). The Committee expressed their regrets at the resignation of the Vice-Chairman Chris Tapsell and thanked him for his long and helpful service to the Society. Maurice Sayers was elected to remain Chairman, Barry Sheppard will remain the Treasurer, Jo Walker the Secretary, other committee members will be as last year: Marion Banks-Nash, Pam Sayers, Shelley Jackson and Ken Hammond. Our next committee meeting will be held at John and Shelley Jackson's house Foxgloves at Ellinge on Tuesday 28 February 2006 at 8 p.m. The future programme was discussed: Paul Tapsell will be asked to lead the Christmas Walk (27 December from Village Hall Car Park at 10.30 a.m.) and again, everyone is welcome. The annual excursion was discussed, it being agreed that the visit to Brook Agricultural Museum had been successful, and it was suggested that the matter be left for the Committee to decide. Unfortunately the then current colour technology of handcoloured lithography was expensive, causing the card to retail at one shilling (£3.63 in today's money) and the card failed. However by 1860 the new process of chromolithography, allowing cheap and intricate colour reproduction, was well established. When the halfpenny post was introduced in 1870, for unsealed envelopes, the Christmas card really took off, and the Post Office issued its first 'Post early for Christmas' advice in 1880. It is hardly surprising then that we now exchange some 1 billion cards each Christmas in the UK, at an average rate of 160 million a day. Last January the Woodland Trust collected and recycled 58 million cards weighing 1,150 tonnes, and is aiming to achieve a new target of 60 million this January. As an illustration of the environmental benefits of recycling on this scale, the Woodland Trust calculates that recycling just one Christmas card will save enough electricity to enable 105 people to watch the Oueen's Christmas day message next year, which should indeed be encouragement. WATER PIPES - correction

Newsletter I included an article about the water pipe along the valley. Folkestone and Dover Water Company Services have read this article and say that the information given, as interpreted at November presentation. give Rosemary Heddle a call on incorrect. I therefore apologise for the errors and am pleased to publish the correct facts, which are: The ponds at Bushy Ruff have a low water level because of lower than average rain fall and will refill when persistent rain arrives. No decision has been made as to whether to abstract water from Bushy Ruff and discussions are continuing with the Environment Agency (EA) who will conclude whether there is enough water at the site to allow abstraction. If they do obtain a license the water will be pumped to Lye Oak and that is why there is only one pipe going along the valley. Part of their proposals for development at Bushy Ruff was to work with EA in creating an augmentation system that would pump water into the nearby lake during drought periods and the EA plan to line part of the lake to act as a refuge for wildlife. If the water company does not source water from Bushy Ruff then the system will have to developed by the EA.

> PIMLICO WAY which runs from South Alkham across the hill to Slip Lane is already a byway open to all traffic and some years ago Alkham Valley Society replanted the hedge and trees which were previously grubbed out by a farmer. KCC gave a grant for this and they consider that it is the AVS's responsibility to keep the hedge cut but the latter think that it was not a never-ending agreement and that KCC should cut it. The AVS are going to write to KCC.

MAIN DRAINAGE - The houses at Drellingore have cess pit drainage and it was hoped that the main drainage would be extended to cover these properties. The Environment Agency was asked to act as arbitrator between the residents and the sewage authority and has refused the request. The Parish Council thought this unfair as it is possible that the size of the cess pits will have to be increased to meet current regulations and that the cost of emptying the cess pits will have to be met by the householders.

OZ on LITTLE EGRETS

After the Christmas snow thawed we ran our dog in Kearsney Abbey, noting on the way a heron, still and grey in the gloom. Soon another blizzard sprang up and we returned, finding our 'heron' smaller and apparently covered in fresh snow. It was, of course, a different and rarer heron, a Little Egret with brilliant white body, distinctive yellow feet and black legs. For the first three days of the New Year our house gave a grandstand view of the bird, glowing white against the muddy riverbank and feeding nervously in the shallows. Local papers reported later that a pair of egrets had taken up residence on Barton Path, in Dover, a first for this location. The Little Egret (Egretta garzetta) is another example of a species that has increased dramatically in the UK recently, perhaps due to global warming. In the 1950s its winter quarters crept north from Spain, through France, to reach Brownsea Island in Poole Harbour in 1996 and County Cork in 1997. Before this expansion, the Little Egret's main claim to fame was as supplier of plumes. particularly for hats, in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Cocker and Mabey, in Birds Britannica, describe how egret feathers sometimes traded at 20 times the value of silver weight-for-weight. Some feathers were obtained humanely from egret farms, where birds were cared for and plucked four times a vear. However the main source of imported feathers was from the killing of millions of wild egrets, a slaughter that led directly to the formation of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds in 1889 and the banning of the plume trade in 1920. Appropriately the RSPB Nature Reserve Dungeness has long been the best local site for viewing these lovely birds. (Steve Osborn)

Whilst I was at Martinvale two beautiful floral tributes were delivered, one from the Mail on Sunday and the other from the Sunday Mirror.

The generator was supplied by an outside contractor and an engineer had to come down from Sidcup to repair it, which accounts for the long delay.

SHEEP - Two sheep have been killed in the field to the east of Short Lane by dogs. The farmer hasn't taken any action on this occasion but dog owners are asked to make sure their dogs are under control at all times as the sheep are extremely vulnerable.

Peter Frater had to resign from his position as Parish Councillor because of pressure of work. The post was advertised and posters placed on the village notice board and in the Old Post Office but no applicants came forward. people around the village have commented on group а motorcyclists who look fairly menacing with their masks and ride aggressively on the RuPP's and byways around the village. Davis, who lives Wolverton Hill and walks her dogs on the byway leading from Ewell Minnis to Temple Ewell, says that since December 2005, there have been 3 or 4 occasions where she and her hounds have come close to being mown down by 'sinister'looking bikers hurtling about where dogs have previously been safe to run off-leash. Although she is beginning to recognise the awful noise predicting their approach, it is still extremely difficult to recall the dogs quickly enough to jump out of their pathway. They never make any attempt to slow down, despite the fact that she is clearly struggling to maintain control. Needless to say, she has found it to be a quite terrifying experience on each occasion and wonders if pedestrians have lost all their rights? Barbara Newitt and her sister were verbally abused by them at Common Hill and I was ridden at when cycling back into the village by a motorcycle coming up Short Lane at speed. A letter has been written to the Parish Council asking them if they would inform the police such that they can be contacted, should the riders reappear, and in the first place give them a warning. It appears that these riders do not belong to the Trail riding group, who do ride responsibly.

CHALKSOLE GREEN Whilst walking the dog I went through Chalksole Green, which is an official village green at the top of White Hill, and it was terrific to see six ducks in the smaller pond and three in the other, which was puddled by John Huggins. The Conservation Committee have been doing a lot of work around the green and the laid hedge plus removal of undergrowth has transformed the site. Congratulations to all those who are taking part. I think the larger pond may still be leaking as the ducks were walking as well as swimming so I understand it may have to be lined. The puddling was hampered by hot and dry weather.

TRAIL RIDERS - A number of SCAM - One of our employees was called on Wednesday from "VISA". and I was called on Thursday from "MasterCard". Note, the callers do your ask for card number; they already have it. The scam works like this: Person calling says, "This is (name), and I'm calling and Fraud from the Security Department at VISA. My Badge number is 12460. Your card has flagged for an unusual purchase pattern, and I'm calling to verify. This would be on your VISA card that was issued by (name of bank). Did you purchase an Anti-Telemarketing Device for £249.99 from a Marketing company based in (name of any town or city)?" When you say "No" the caller continues with, "Then we will be issuing a credit to your account. Before your next statement, the credit will be sent to (gives you your address), is that correct?" You say "yes". The caller continues - "I will be starting a Fraud investigation. If you have any questions, you should call the 0800 number listed on the back of your card and ask for Security. You will need to refer to this Control Number. The caller then gives you a 6 digit number. "Do you need me to read it again?" Here's the IMPORTANT part on how the scam works. The caller then says, "I need to verify you are in possession of your card". He'll ask you to turn your card over and look for some numbers". There are 7 numbers: the first 4 are part of your card number, the next 3 are the security Numbers that verify you are the possessor of the card. The caller will ask you to read the 3 numbers to him. After you tell the caller the 3 numbers, he'll say, "That is correct, I just needed to verify that the card has not been lost or stolen, and that you still have your card. Do you have any other questions?" After you say No, the caller then thanks you and states, "Don't hesitate to call back; if you do", and hangs up. You actually say very little, and they never ask for or tell you the Card number. But after we were called on Wednesday, we called back within 20 minutes to ask a question. Are we glad we did! The REAL VISA Security Department told us it was a scam and in the last 15 minutes a new purchase of £249.99 was charged to our card. (Shelley Jackson)

HOBSON-JOBSON on Recently BBC2, in partnership with the Oxford English Dictionary, ran the series Balderdash and Piffle, attempting to "ante-date" certain English words and phrases, ie find written evidence of them before the OED dates. In the final programme, a request for "balti" before 1983 sent me scurrying for my precious copy of Hobson-Jobson. Subtitled glossary of Anglo-Indian Hope is trying to do something colloquial words and phrases and about the situation and in April a containing 1020 densely-printed pages, it is a treasure-house that illustrates India's huge influence on the English language. The book originated in a friendship between Col Henry Yule of the Bengal Engineers and Dr Arthur Burnell of the Madras Civil Service. They met only once, at the India Library, and afterwards exchanged devoted to building an Anglo-Indian dictionary. Sadly, Burnell died in 1882, four years before publication of their book. Hobson-Jobson was revised in 1903 and was then out of print for many years. The second edition was republished in 1968 and it is this edition that I acquired 20 years ago. Like all good dictionaries Hobson-Jobson takes the reader on a magical mystery tour, from 'calico' to 'khaki' to 'dungarees' to 'dinghy', surprises on the way such as 'pundit', 'toddy' 'chintz'. and Hobson-Jobson's words from many sources, includina traders' languages, scientific and technical terms and Civil Service jargon. 'Hobson-Jobson' is itself an example of another important class of words, being an Anglo-Saxon corruption of "Ya Hasan! Ya Hosain!" heard at Moharram Festivals. The term was applied later to any word derived by mispronouncing Indian, such as 'shampoo' from 'champo' and 'pyjamas' from 'jammas', and then to all such words from any such 'plonk'. language, as Australian for 'vin blanc'. Perhaps we now need a universal Hobson-Jobson reflecting the internet and new words arising from such hybrids Spanglish as Chinglish. (Steve Osborn)

Robin St J Knowles C.B.E., Q.C., M.A., Barrister - Further to the report the editor was kind enough to insert in last month's Newsletter following the news that Robin (elder son of Margaret and Norman Knowles) was to be invested C.B.E. (Commander British Empire) we report as follows: The investiture by the Queen at Buckingham Palace took place on 9th February 2006. Like most other novice birders I have great difficulty in identifying warblers, and am only really sure GREEN WASTE - Dover District of them when my friend Ted is over from Canada and tells me what they are. It was therefore gratifying, in January's snowstorms, to see so many blackcaps still scraping a living in East Kent. The blackcap (Sylvia atricapilla) is distinguished by its neat black cap. and is known all over Europe by similar names, such as the Dutch 'Zwartkop', French 'Fauvette à tête noire', and Scandinavian 'munk' for 'monk'. (And here I would welcome little help as my German dictionary translates 'mönchsgrasmücke' as 'monk grass mosquito'. Any offers?). Most European blackcaps migrate to Southern Spain and North Africa the winter. However an increasing number of birds have been over-wintering in Britain and Ireland, sometimes as far north as Scotland. Part of the reason must be global warming, but it is thought that the increase also results from the adaptability of blackcaps in feeding from winter birdtables and peanut bags. Researchers have now discovered that blackcaps that winter in the north produce more eggs and healthier offspring. This is because both parents are less tired than the southern migrants, and can also beat them to the choicest breeding grounds Spring. An even more recent line of research suggests that blackcaps are becoming generally hardier in the evolutionary struggle because they have learned to recognise and reject cuckoos' eggs in their nests. Some authorities believe that these changes, particularly with respect migration, are winter revolutionary that two distinct species could eventually evolve. I don't mind, so long as they preserve their beautiful song which Gilbert White memorably described in a 1774 letter to Thomas Pennant as a "full, sweet, deep, loud and wild pipe". (Steve Osborn)

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WHY IS THERE a Rectory and a Vicarage in Alkham? I always wondered why and came across a book which gave the answer. The word Parish comes from parachio, which means households within an area and at first described the territory for which the bishop was responsible. Later, as bishops delegated spiritual care a Parish described a smaller area under the control of a rector who collected the tithe. This was a primitive tax (a bit like council tax) being a tenth of produce from each household, such as wheat which could be stored in the tithe barn. If the rector didn't want to serve the Parish in person, he would arrange a legal substitute, a vice or a vicarious (hence vicar) to whom he gave, usually a small part, of the tithe. The distinction of rector and vicar is still maintained but is somewhat blurred and it appears as though a parson can be taken as either. (editor)

If you see a suspicious car parked, lights off which then drives away, make a note of the number (or part). Covert cameras can also be installed by the police.

If you feel you are vulnerable to people calling, try and get a nominated neighbour. Have a piece of paper to hold up which gives the name and address of the neighbour asking the caller to see them. All the utilities know of this scheme (i.e. British Gas etc).

The legislation around the composting of kitchen been waste has tightened following the Foot and Mouth outbreak and this material now needs specific treatment. Alkham Valley has not received the black box scheme due to the rural nature of the area. Initially, the priority for the Council was to collect as much tonnage from as many properties to reduce costs. However, now that the second phase of the Green Waste Recycling Scheme has been successfully introduced Alkham Valley, the collection of paper, cans and glass in black boxes for recycling is being reviewed. I do expect Alkham to be one of the areas highlighted. However, I hope you can understand that the review will take some time and it may be several months before we have finished delivering boxes to those added to the recycling collection scheme. OZ on NZ - Mark Twain wrote "If it would not look too much like showing off, I would tell the reader where New Zealand is", adding "people think that New Zealand is close to Australia...and that you cross to it on a bridge." Having now been. I know that NZ is actually at the end of a day-long journey seven miles up in a metal tube. Like many young people in the 1960s we considered emigrating to NZ, hesitated because of the mums, got busy and the moment was gone. So this February, with my wife's sister and her husband, we took a 6-berth campervan on a pilgrimage to what might have been. It was a delirious, slightly surrealistic, four weeks, travelling clockwise round South Island from one campsite to another, with red wine and cards instead television in the evenings. We marvelled at the ever-changing landscape; the vast Canterbury Plains, quirky Otago Peninsula, maiestic Milford Sound and snowcapped Southern Alps. There was constant exotic rain-forest atmosphere, with cicadas clicking day and night, and albatrosses, penguins, seals and dolphins never far away. Finally we took the ferry to North Island, drove up the middle to Auckland, and enjoyed the hot geysers and Maori displays at Rotorua. Inevitably, fascinating tales are heard on such a holiday. For me, the story that best sums up the spirit of this energetic but compassionate society is that of the 28th Maori Regiment at the Battle of Point 209, a hill in Tunisia, in March 1943. After a day and night of bloody hand-to-hand fighting, Rommel's troops were offered an honourable truce if they surrendered. They declined and regrouped to defend the hill. As the assault recommenced, hundreds of Maoris sprang up and performed the Haka, upon which the enemy waved white flags surrendered. (Steve Osborn)

He finally met Mozart at Florence, and the two young men instantly became firm friends. On year old Linley was appointed leader of Drury Lane Theatre orchestra and began to compose, writing during the concertos, two operas, three oratorios and countless songs and madrigals. However, little is known about JOSEPH MOUNT who died 11 Oct 1918 age 23 and is buried at Alkham. What is strange is that the only likely death registration index was at Salford, near Manchester, maybe in one of the Military Hospitals in that area. The mystery remains as to why he was not listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, Also. if he died at Salford it must have been quite an expensive procedure to bring him back to Alkham for burial. I wonder who paid for that? What seems certain is that the Alkham community regarded his demise as being a result of his war service, because his name has been put forward, and accepted for inclusion on the memorial. The MOUNT family lived at Ewell Minnis throughout the 19th & early 20th centuries working on local farms. They married into well known local families. Should someone read this article and has any information at all on JOSEPH or the MOUNT family do please contact me. (Susan Lees)

Although George had his children baptised at Alkham Edward 1889, George 1891 and Frederick 1892 they had moved out of Maggot Farm by 1891. OZ on SUMMER

As I write, our footballers have won their opening game in this year's World Cup, a drought has been declared. and temperature is soaring into the Fahrenheit eighties. It is in fact the start of an English dream summer, which I hope will be carrying on as you read, and raises memories of two impressive events. The first was forty years ago, on 30 July 1966 at Wembley, when, in front of a crowd numbering some 95,000, England beat West Germany 4-2 after extra time to win the World Cup. That was the last final to use a plain oldfashioned ball, as from 1970 onwards the World Cup used the Adidas "Telstar ball", with black pentagons on white to aid visibility on black and white television screens. The second memoryjogger, from thirty years ago, was the Great Drought of 1976, which actually started in October 1975. For nearly a year the rainfall measured at Kew was only 43% of the average, with no spring rainfall at all over much of southern England. The drought worsened with intense sunshine in May 1976 when temperatures in Kent rose to 84°F, followed by a heatwave giving temperatures of over 90°F every day during the last week in June and the first week in July. At the time. I worked in a drawing office, and in the afternoons we dusted our hands and forearms with French chalk to prevent them sticking to the drawings. One Ωf consequences of the prolonged heat was a plague of ladybirds that only finished when millions of the creatures died from starvation underfoot. being crushed Finally Denis Howell became "Minister for Drought". Within days of his appointment the drought ended with a colossal downpour on August Bank Holiday, of course. (Steve Osborn)

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SANCTUARIES OF STONE

I was recently reading an article in the NFU magazine (July 06) about the wonders of the rural churchyard and how it is a haven for fauna and It particularly mentioned floral. lichens growing on older gravestones. The stonework in churchyards in areas where no chemical sprays have been used, such as St Anthony's, is vitally important for the conservation of lichen. There are a staggering 1,500 or so species of lichen in Britain, over 300 of which have been documented growing on churchyard stones in England. Apparently, lichen is a combination of two "plants" - the bit you can see is fungus, but inside this there are cells of algae that provide the lichen with food from sunlight in the same way green plants utilise the sun. Lichen is sometimes as old as the gravestones upon which it is found because it grows extremely slowly. The reason lichen colonies are greater on the top of gravestones is because it is fertilised by bird To help conserve droppings. churchvard lichen. the article suggests that we should not allow gravestones to become overgrown with brambles or shaded by tall To encourage the lichen, limestone and sandstone should be used for the headstones. (So please bear this in mind when making a will!). (Patsy Sayers)

WHITFIELD ACTION

GROUP has been formed because of the large planned expansion of houses at Whitfield. The Alkham Parish Council has been asked for its support and as a result a councillor will attend their next meeting. The main effect on Alkham would be the increase in traffic along the valley which already stands at about 6000 vehicles per day.

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TWO PEOPLE who live opposite Short Lane were at the Parish Council meeting to express their concern about the speed that traffic travels round the bend towards Dover from the village green. OZ on BRADGATE

The final chapter of John Buchan's spy thriller The Thirty-nine Steps concerns "various parties converging on the sea" at "Bradgate", in northeast Kent. Bradgate is, of course, Broadstairs, and behind the fictional story of Richard Hannay is a fascinating true story of John Buchan. In July 1914, two days before war was declared, the Buchans took their daughter Alice to Broadstairs to convalesce after ear operation. However Buchan, overworked, stressed, and depressed by the onset of war, was soon ill himself and took to his bed with an ulcer that plagued him for the rest of his life. There he found time to write the thriller that he had planning mentally for been some time. His wife Susan thought that, but for the ulcer, The Thirty-nine Steps might never have been written. The Buchans stayed in a villa called St Cuby, on North Foreland, which appears in the final chapter as Trafalgar Lodge, on "big the Ruff. chalk headland". The tenancy included access to a private beach via stairs comprising two and three tunnelled sections, which are still in place. There are now 108 concrete steps, built in the 1940s to replace the 78 oak steps that existed in 1914. There has been much about Buchan's speculation decision to reduce the number of steps in his story to 39. Some say that he chose his others that he was advised by a publisher or friend to change the number to enhance the story's title. Surely the last word must be with his wife. In her biography Buchan, published in 1947, she said "How many steps were there I do not know, but John hit on the number thirty-nine as that would be easily remembered and would catch people's imagination." Joseph must have served in WWI, but been invalided out, reason unknown but possibly he had been weakened from something like a gas attack and with little resistance contracted Enteric/Typhoid Fever from which he died. OZ on BUNTHORNE

One day in 1930s Lancashire voung Robert Smithies, waiting for fish and chips at the kitchen table, was reading a vinegar bottle when he noticed gleefully what the name 'Gartons' spelt backwards. It was the start of a passion for words that only ended with his death, aged 72, on 31s year. this During July remarkable life Smithies enjoyed popular success as press television photographer, presenter and editor, and, since 1966, as a Guardian crossword setter under the pen-name of 'Bunthorne'. Bob, as he was otherwise known, was born in Middleton, Lancashire, on 4th April 1934, into a working family valued education and encouraged Bob and his two sisters in their studies. In 1950, at the age of 16, Bob left school to work in the Manchester Evening News darkroom, moving on to the Guardian Manchester photographer in 1955, where he staved during the change to the London-based Guardian in the 1960s. Typical of this era was Don McPhee's recollection that at Christmas 1970 Bob tossed a bound compilation of Picture Post features across the Manchester picture desk to him and said: "Here you are lad, learn yourself summ'at." In 1974 Bob joined Granada Television as news editor but was soon redeployed as presenter of such programmes as the long-running Down to Earth. Bob was always a devoted solver and setter of crossword puzzles and had a puzzle accepted by the Guardian in 1966. For the rest of his life he composed puzzles for the Guardian and others 'Bunthorne', a character from his beloved Gilbert and Sullivan. Bunthorne's elegant puzzles were highly regarded by solvers and fellow compilers, the clueing often fiendishly difficult but always scrupulously fair. Crossworders could argue for years about Bunthorne's 'best' clue, but his simply: own favourite was "Amundsen's forwarding address (4)". (Steve Osborn)

OZ on ODONATA - During this warm and pleasant summer it was thrilling to see so many dragonflies and damselflies, first at Bushey Ruff, then in our back garden, and later everywhere, and to discover something about them. Dragonflies (Anisoptera) and damselflies (Zygoptera) belong to the same order, Odonata (meaning 'toothed jaw'). *Anisoptera* means "unequal-winged", since dragonflies' hind wings are shorter and wider than their forewings. They are large insects, with touching eyes, and often wander far away from water. Zygoptera means "yoke-winged", as damselflies have four equal wings. They are small insects, with separated eyes, and stay close to the water. Odonata are invariably slender and beautiful, and come in a huge range of translucent colours. Altogether there are some 5,300 species in the world, only 38 of which live in Britain, as they favour warmer climates. Perhaps because of their comparative rareness and exotic appearance, Odonata have traditionally been objects of superstition in Europe. In mediaeval times dragonflies were called the "devil's darning needles" as it was believed that they would sew up the eyes of anyone foolish enough to fall asleep outdoors during the day. Conversely, in the East, the dragonfly has long been revered. Japan, the first country in the world to create a national Dragonfly Nature Reserve, sometimes refers to itself as Akitsushima (the Dragonfly Island). Perhaps the finest description of these elegant and colourful creatures in English literature is in Tennyson's lines, The Dragon-Fly. "Today I saw the dragon-fly / Come from the wells where he did lie. / An inner impulse rent the veil / Of his old husk: from head to tail / Came out clear plates of sapphire mail. / He dried his wings: like gauze they grew; / Thro' crofts and pastures wet with dew / A living flash of light he flew." RECYCLING OF WASTE

The delivery of October's Alkham Monthly Newsletter coincided with my reading of a trade journal concerning 'green' living. Against the background of our village collection program (and the article 'A bit of a whinge') perhaps the following statistics may be of interest. Britain is the third worst recycler in Europe and we need to work hard to catch up with countries like Holland and Germany recycle more than half their waste. Who is behind us? Well, Portugal on 3 per cent and Greece on 8 per cent. The UK recycles 18 per cent of its domestic waste. At the other end of the table, The Netherlands recycle 65 per cent. According to the Institute for Public Policy Research the annual generated by each person in this country is 600 kg and which is comparable with our European neighbours. lf each home recycled 50 per cent of its rubbish the UK's annual CO2 emissions would drop by 6 million tonnes. So well done to Ken and Brian for taking the initiative in helping Alkham to become а 'greener' village.

OZ on LOMEA - There cannot be many East Kent dwellers unaware of the existence and proximity of the Goodwin Sands, named after King Harold's father, Earl Godwin. Even so I only discovered this week, while browsing in the excellent The Lore of the Land by Westwood Simpson, that Lomea was the ancient name given to the island supposed to have submerged to form the Sands. The name almost certainly derives from Old English lam for 'loam', as the Sands comprise Blue Clay and sand strata overlying a chalk outcrop, and were reputed to be extremely fertile in Godwin's time. It was known to the Romans as Infera Insula, meaning 'lowest island'; legend has it being so low as to need a complete seawall surround. The story continues that William the Conqueror gave Lomea to St Augustine's Abbey, Canterbury, but the abbot neglected the sea-wall, and the island was lost in the great storms of 1099, forming what we know as the Goodwin Sands. Experts now doubt the tales of an inhabitable island, R J Cloet, in the June 1954 Geographical Journal, stated that in Caesar's time such an island would still be covered by 10 feet of water every high tide, and would anyway have been swept away in about AD400, when North Sea levels rose generally. The Sands have remained a menace to shipping ever since, and have expanded steadily over the last two prompting hundred years, governments to think of useful things to build on them. Ideas included lighthouses (rejected in favour of lightships), gunnery ranges, heavy industry, prisons, and ambitious harbour projects, including part of a bridge/tunnel channel crossing. The site has also been considered for the third London airport, giving rise to the intriguing but unlikely possibility it being renamed "London Lomea". (Steve Osborn)

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CHRISTMAS FOLKLORE - Have you ever wondered why you hang baubles on the Christmas tree, or why we put up a tree in the place? There are many customs associated with the festive season, so how did this one come about? Glass baubles on a tree came about as the result of a drunken game among glass blowers, who being very busy worked up a thirst. Many drinks later they began to see who could blow the biggest glass bauble. These were later to be discarded but their wives being clever called them spirit balls and sold them on the local market. They proved popular and a thriving business was born. Christmas trees originated from the pagan act of worshipping the oak tree. Attempts by early missionaries failed to stamp out this practice. so it was absorbed in the Christian faith, swapping the oak for a fir tree, as its original shape symbolised the Holy Trinity. HOUSES - At the Alkham Parish Council meeting chairman of the Sutton PC, Graham Smith, spoke about the number of houses that intended to be built in the Whitfield The area Local Development Framework (LDF) says that 10,000 new houses should be built but the South East Regional Authority (SERA) advises 6100. Graham said that they accept that new houses have to be built but all the houses in excess of 6100 will have to be built on green field sites and therefore the SERA option should be adopted. He also said that there were a lot of houses in the Dover District that could be refurbished but as new houses are VAT free and improvements not, then the tendency was for new houses to be constructed. Dover District Council is in favour of 10,000 houses being built and Graham Smith asked the Alkham Parish Council if they would support him in advocating that 6,100 should be built in the first instance. There was unanimous agreement with this motion and the council will write to the relevant authority in his support.

OZ on FESSENDEN

An unanswerable question from the last 120 years is "Who invented radio?" As with today's computer internet, radio technology developed rapidly and globally, particularly with the Great War looming, and it is difficult now to untangle just who devised what. However, one notable occurred 100 years ago this month. During the cold and stormy night of Christmas Eve 1906, radio operators on ships off the New England coast were amazed to hear a faint human voice emerging from the dots and dashes on their Marconi Morse stations. As news spread crewmen gathered round receivers, the voice announced itself Reginald that

Fessenden, presenting a programme of speech and music. Fessenden then transmitted a recording of Handel's *Largo* from an Edison cylinder, read a passage from the Bible describing Christ's birth,

sang O Holy Night loudly while accompanying himself on the violin, and finished with Christmas wishes and a promise to broadcast again on New Year's Eve. It was the first-ever public radio broadcast, and followed Fessenden's earlier successful experiments in audio signals. Born in Quebec in 1866, Fessenden was awarded a mathematics scholarship at the age of 14, but left college four vears later with no degree and with little technical training. Hoping to some experience with electricity, Fessenden wrote Edison "Don't know anything about electricity, but can learn pretty quick", to which Edison replied "Have enough men already who don't know about electricity". However, Edison later recruited Fessenden as technician, starting

him on a long career inventing for other radio companies, the Niagara Falls Power Plant and for the British



government during the Great War. Fessenden died in Bermuda in 1932, holding over 500 patents in fields as diverse as sonar research, microfilm, seismology and anti-artillery devices.
