SECRET ARMY - Drellingore featured in the article about the pumping station and again features with regard to the secret army. In the months after Dunkirk the British realised that there was a distinct possibility of a German invasion and in the south there was over 400 miles of coast to protect. The army division responsible for its defence was pitifully ill-equipped so it was decided to set up a 'devil-may-care' force of volunteers to outwit the German divisions. Auxiliary units were scattered throughout Kent and Sussex and were largely made up of civilians who knew the area like the back of their hands. Security was very tight and few people knew of their existence. In the autumn of 1940 sappers were sent into the countryside to build underground bunkers and one of these was at Drellingore. It was on the hillside about 1km from the nearest road in the middle of a coppice. The chamber was about 5 metres square with an entrance hole covered with a hinged tree stump. The group was commanded by Lieutenant Lines with Sergeant George Marsh, Thomas Holmans, Charles Fayers, Dennis Dewar and Samuel Osborne (the details for this article were provided by Gill Osborne, the daughter of Samuel who used to live at Drellingore Farm, from an article written by Roy Humphries for the local press). They were issued with a .38 Smith and Wessen revolver, a commando knife and a brass knuckleduster. The men were trained to wreak havoc on the Germans and twice a week they mustered at the bunker and attended training sessions at Wye and Bilting where they learned the skills of unarmed combat and how to kill silently. They also attended evening practice in the grounds of Tappington Hall at Denton where they were shown how to throw grenades and learn about explosives. Whilst their primary function was to blow up fuel and ammunition dumps they were also required to blow up buildings which might be of use if the invasion happened. One of these buildings was Hockley Sole, which is near the crossroads at Lower Standen and also the high brick rail viaduct in Folkestone would have been demolished. If the men had been caught they would almost certainly have been shot as they effectively didn't exist. The Drellingore bunker has now disappeared although part of the concrete shaft may remain and the defence squads were disbanded in 1943. Editor

ASH DIEBACK – A house owner in the village has reported that some of the ash trees in his property appear to be affected by the dieback disease. If you think that any ash trees in your property or any that you have seen are affected by the disease please report it to The Food and Environment Research Agency (FERA) by phoning 08459 33 55 77 or email plant.health.info@fera.gsi.gov.uk . Indications of the disease are dark usually diamond shaped lesions on the bark or tiny fungi growth on stalks in early autumn. When in leaf, blackening of the leaf extending into the veins and stalk and dieback of the crown of the tree with a flush of new growth below.

**GARDENING TIPS** – I'm pleased to report that from next month there will be a regular feature giving gardening tips for the month written by Geoff and Margaret Hillier.

**DRAINAGE** – The Parish Council meeting on the 7<sup>th</sup> January was dominated by discussion about problems caused by the Nailbourne flooding and Kent Highways not keeping drains clear. To deal with the Nailbourne flowing a dyke was dug some years ago and it is the responsibility of the landowners to keep it clear. The problem is that most of the blockage in the dyke is caused by the silt being washed off the road and therefore it seems reasonable that Highways should deal with the matter. The culverts and pipes are similarly affected and the result is that the bottom of Meggett Lane becomes under water and there is a good chance that flooding will occur elsewhere. Another problem is the turnover of staff at Highways such that the new people don't know the historical facts. The Parish Council are trying to put as much pressure as they can on KCC Highways to deal with the matter and some work has started. Also in the past channels have been cut in the sides of the road to allow water to flood onto adjacent land but Highways are not willing to continue this practice. As a result water streams down Lockeringe Lane and then hits a barrier of hedge cuttings and debris lodged on the road gulley before shooting over the road onto Hopton Manor resulting in property damage. Kent Highways do have budget problems but let's hope they can find resources to resolve the situation.

A SURPRISING DISCOVERY – John and Hilary Mitchell lived at Thorn Cottage on Meggett Lane until 2007. They both came from what they believed to be long-established northern stock having lived in the Manchester area. In 2010 John began to research the ancestry of his paternal grandmother and it confirmed the northern connection but the 1881 census suggested that her grandfather had been born in Dover and that his wife, Susanna, was from Alkham. Susanna's parents, Richard and Hannah (nee Rouse) Fakeley had been married in St Anthony's, Alkham on October 13th 1819 and spent all their married life living in the Chalksole Green area. Richard and Hannah had a number of children, one of them being Susanna John's great-great-grandmother, and she was baptised in St Anthony's on 20<sup>th</sup> October 1833. She later married John Mercer as shown on the birth certificate of Susanna's son, John Henry Mercer. One hundred and fifty years later John and Hilary knew nothing of this when they attended St. Anthony's and walked through the graveyard where John's ancestors are buried and John wonders if there is someone in the Alkham area today, reading this, who also has a Fakeley in their family tree or any further information. 

pespite one of the gloomiest summers on record, in its first year of operation the St Anthony's solar photovoltaic (PV) system actually exceeded its electricity production target of 3,067 kWh. In so doing it saved some 1.6 tons of carbon dioxide entering the

atmosphere from generating electricity from non-renewable sources, such as coal and gas. For comparison, the average UK house uses about 2,500 kWh of electricity a year. As the attached graph shows, most of the electricity was generated in the sunnier March to September period. Don't be fooled by those that claim that solar PV works well even on cloudy days. It needs direct sunlight to generate appreciable amounts of electricity. Winter months generated only about 15% of the electricity in the summer months. The clue is in the name! Here is to a sunnier 2013. **Geoff Gaskill** 

OZ on PHENOLOGY UPDATE - Stuck for a theme this month, I looked back ten years to my February 2003 story on phenology, which I had defined informally as 'the study of organisms as affected by climate, using the dates of seasonal phenomena such as opening of flowers or arrival of migrant birds.' The article went on to discuss the history of phenology and in particular the work of the UK Phenology Network, a partnership between research biologist Tim Sparks of the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology, at Cambridge, and the Woodland Trust. It was here that I realised that an update was needed, as so much progress has been made in the last ten years in recording and evaluating results. Between 1998 and 2003 the number of observers rose, from 74 to 18,600. Now, just ten years later, over 50,000 people, both amateurs and professionals, are involved. The Nature's Calendar Survey combines observations with historical records, providing a database of over 2 million records from the UK since the 1600s. Members are not required to be experts as the Nature's Calendar team provides free assistance, identification booklets and recording forms. If preferred, members may record their observations online. contacted online may be at naturescalendar @woodlandtrust.org.uk or at Woodland Trust, Kempton Way, NG31 6LL, or by 'phoning 01476 584878. Phenology is a pleasant activity that I recommend unreservedly, not least because it is totally unstressful. There is no pressure to tick every, or indeed any, boxes on the recording form, as all that matters is the anonymous aggregate of entries. I am in fact returning to it now after a lapse of three years when my personal circumstances were disrupted. My first entry this year? A catkin near the A4 on the way home from Berkshire on 12 January. (Steve Osborn)

OZ on TRANSLATION - Every Boxing Day, I hibernate with the most enticing book received, and devour it very guickly, often within a day or two. This year was very different. It took the whole of Christmas week followed by a week in Malta for me to digest Is That a Fish in Your Ear? by David Bellos. The content of the book is much more difficult than the jokey title might suggest, and is described perfectly by its subtitle The Amazing Adventure of Translation. Bellos is Princeton professor in the fields both of Translation and French Literature, and is best known as an authority on, and translator of, the works of the French writer Georges Perec. He explains for general readers all the problems and complexities of translation, by writing some 400 pages in 32 short chapters, each containing a huge amount of information and humour, with titles such as "Meaning is No Simple Thing" and "The Myth of Literal Translation." The latter title highlights the problems involved in translation when there isn't an equivalent word in the other language. The "100 Eskimo words for snow" story is now exploded as a myth, but the fact remains that in Russian, there are words for "light blue" and "dark blue", but not for "blue", while some languages have no word at all for 'left' or 'right.' Bellos concludes with an optimistic epilogue, asserting that we should see translation as civilizing rather than divisive, adding that "Languages merge when people do." It took me a while to decode the main title, which derives from Douglas Adams's Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, where the mythical Babel fish, stuck in the ear, gives instant and perfect translation. It's an unlikely development, comments Bellos, while acknowledging the impressive achievements of some web-based translation tools. Steve Osborn



#### **KENT WILDLIFE TRUST**

South Alkham Farm and Lockeringe Wood was designated as a Kent Local Wildlife Site in 2012 because it contains ancient woodland which supports at least 26 ancient plant species and unimproved chalk grassland. Its designation is non-statutory and the only protection comes via the planning system but landowners are given advice and

help with regard to maintaining the site and applying for grants. Sladden Wood, on the east of the village, has been a KLW site for some years.

PARISH REGISTERS ON LINE - It is now possible to view a number of Church of England parish registers, covering baptisms, marriages and burials for many churches in the historic Archdeanery of Canterbury, often from 1538-2005 including ALKHAM http://www.findmypast.co.uk/ website. These registers can be browsed under the 'Search' section, titled Canterbury Collection. If looking for a specific name the 'parish records search' facility is new, and very useful. Also included is the register of baptisms at the Buckland (Dover) Workhouse between 1855 and 1912, which includes Alkham, Capel-le-Ferne, Hougham, Lydden and Temple Ewell. To search the indexes is free, otherwise the website requires a payment. However, the whole of the Findmypast website is free to use at any of the Kent Public Libraries - you just need to get a membership ticket and book a computer for one hour. Janet Adamson


OZ on PARAPROSDOKIAN - An amusing email, currently doing the rounds, concerns the word 'paraprosdokian', meaning a phrase that ends in a surprising way, such as 'Where there's a will I want to be in it' and describing the derivation of the word from the Greek 'para prosdokia', meaning 'beyond expectation. I immediately thought "What a lovely topic for Alkham readers." But guess what? Neither the word, nor its derivation, appears in the Oxford English Dictionary. The Canadian writer Bill Casselman has exploded the myth on his website "Words of the World" at www.Billcasselman.com He considered the term to be ungrammatical and contrived, invented recently by an American professor, then lazily copied by other academics using the internet. In the discussion that followed, according to another authority at www.LanguageHat.com, Casselman reluctantly agreed that the word 'paraprosdokians' was used in an 1891 edition of Punch magazine, but he maintained defiantly that "educated people call them 'sentences with surprise endings.' " I think the word will be accepted soon in the OED, as it's in such common usage now on the internet due to the controversy, and a word is needed as the examples are so funny. Winston Churchill was an expert coiner of these phrases, describing Clement Atlee as 'a modest man, who has much to be modest about', and declaring that "You can always count on the Americans to do the right thing—after they have tried everything else." The writer "Saki" (H H Munro) wrote of a cook who was "good as cooks go, and as cooks go she went." Finally, Groucho Marx once told an unresponsive audience "I've had a perfectly wonderful evening, but this wasn't it." While you're searching for more examples, I'll email the OED to see if they plan to accept the word soon. Steve Osborn

After ten years in the job, Dr Rowan Williams told *The Daily Telegraph* that he had concluded that Britain possibly benefits from having someone to be angry with, and that he had got off more lightly than some. Whatever Archbishop Justin does or says is bound to be criticised by somebody. I wonder, is the Church itself there for people to be angry with, too? I once heard of a woman who was a churchgoer, and passionate about animal rights. She talked to other members of the congregation, offered them pamphlets and invited them to meetings, but nobody seemed to show any interest. Surely the Church should have been doing more for animals? In the end she left in disgust. A while later, she and the Vicar met while shopping. He remarked that he had not seen her in a while, and how was she? There in the supermarket she poured out her anger and frustration - the Church just didn't care about animal rights, she finally told him. "It used to," he replied. "But then you left." ALKHAM VALLEY RESEARCH HISTORICAL RESEARCH GROUP (AVHRG) has planned a number of non-invasive geophysical surveys at different locations within the Alkham Valley for 2013. The continuous wet weather over the winter has put back most of our investigations due to the intrinsic moisture levels retained in the near surface of the soil. High water levels cause a marked reduction in the effectiveness of our instruments and profound effects to the image data collected. Basically, waterlogged areas will make it difficult to see potential smaller archaeological features and reduce the depth at which the instruments can scan. Owing to a substantial amount of our investigation being located in fields and paddocks used for crops and hay, these delays this spring may lead to projects being pushed back until late summer or even moved to 2014. On a more positive note, we are looking to source alternative areas of land that may be more conducive for geophysics. In the meantime, Sub Scan South East Geophysics is commencing the long awaited search for the Roman road from Folkestone to Dover that allegedly runs across the West Down and Church Hougham ridge. With the kind support of Mr & Mrs Stokes of Little Hougham Court Farm, Mr & Mrs Richardson of Farthingloe Farm, two potential locations across this high Down are to be investigated shortly. This important route listed as route 131, has never been archaeologically or geophysically proven and has recently been removed from English Heritage "Roman Roads of Britain" map. Over the next coming weeks and months we would like to broaden our search area in and around Church Hougham with the support of further landowners. If any readers can help by allowing us access to land across the ridge to Abbots Land Farm area or you have any information on Roman finds in the area, we would appreciate your kind

GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY - Much of what we suggested for April still remains to be done, as we are still waiting for the winds to abate and spring to finally arrive! We still need to

beware of frosts until the end of the month, so although summer bedding plants can be 'hardened off' in a sheltered outside spot, there is no rush to plant out. Vegetable seeds can still be planted, and those that have grown can be thinned out. 
was a considerable amount of traffic on the road, and a census had shown that 20 vehicles per hour passed along it. However he said it was of no importance to through traffic and in places there was a considerable drop from the road to the ground below. For an ordinary omnibus to pass it was very dangerous in parts and wholly unsuitable for heavy traffic. A man from Mongeham said he had known the road for 40 years and its use by heavy traffic was detrimental to legitimate traffic. Asked if he used the road the witness said that he did, to his sorrow, on his trotting pony. The East Kent Road Car Company was in favour of the Alkham road because of the congestion in Dover and Deal. So 90 years later nothing much has changed except for the volume of traffic. At peak times it's probably 20 cars a minute and the road is unsuitable for heavy traffic and trotting ponies. **Editor** – Dover Express 1923 – Sue Lee's archive

OZ on LICKBARROW - Ever since my wife died, in April 2010, my children and I have chosen a poem each anniversary to remember and celebrate her, the April theme serving also to symbolize Spring, rebirth, and hope. Last month, I began toying with the idea of compiling an anthology of such poems; perhaps entitled April Showers, maybe with the added words Make May Flowers. In so doing I came across some lines from 200 years ago titled Written in May, 1813, describing a distinctly 'stormy May.' They were written by a little-known poet, Isabella Lickbarrow, born in Kendal in November 1784, the eldest of four daughters of James Lickbarrow, a Quaker school-teacher. When Isabella was five, her mother died, and the girls were raised partly by a great-aunt, while James taught them Latin, Greek and French. After James died, a huge burden fell on 20-year old Isabella as she laboured constantly to fend for herself and her sisters. Isabella had always written poems privately, and in 1811 she began publishing them in the Westmoreland Advertiser. By 1814, the poems had become so popular that the paper published Poetical Effusions, her first book, to instant acclaim. For the rest of her life, Isabella never really achieved sufficient time and money to publish further, and she died in 1846, worn-out and ill, at the age of 62. Poetical Effusions was republished by the Wordsworth Trust in July 2004 after being out of print for many years. Now it's out of print again, and I'm hoping that it will be republished next year on the 10th anniversary of the Wordsworth edition and the 200th anniversary of the first edition. I could then see whether Isabella has, for inclusion in my anthology of optimism, any happy alternatives to "Sad dirges for thy blasted charm." Steve Osborn

Garden tips for June - Some of us are still waiting for spring, so much of May's tips are still relevant. The annual talk of the 'June drop' with fruit trees would be very premature, as at the time of writing the apple blossom is not fully out and it will be sometime before we see any sign of fruits setting. However, seeds

planted in propagators and other seedlings could now be transplanted and sweet peas and bedding plants once the risk of frost recedes. Hardy annual seeds can still be planted and successions of vegetables such as peas and carrots, sweet corn can be sown directly into the soil now. The growing tips of broad beans should be pinched out to prevent blackfly and rose bushes checked for pests and diseases. Remember to consider suitable material for the Show at the Village Fete. **Janet Adamson**



Tonight's event is a lecture by historian Dr David Starkey entitled 'Would Manwood be happy with Manwood's today?' I'm sure there'll be much about the history of the school, but I'm hoping that Starkey will reveal more about Manwood the man, whose nature remains surprisingly elusive for one so powerful and influential. Roger was born in 1532, the second son of Thomas and Catherine Manwood of Sandwich. He was educated at Thomas Ellis's grammar school in Sandwich, trained as a barrister at the Inner Temple, and was called to the bar in 1553. Over the next few years, Roger worked hard in East Kent, as Sandwich Recorder and Counsel to the Cinque Ports, both of which he combined with being the MP for Sandwich continuously from 1558 to 1572. Roger moved from Sandwich in 1563 after being given the huge Hackington estate, near Canterbury, by Queen Elizabeth 1. After working as a circuit judge for many years, Roger was appointed Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer in 1578 and served Queen Elizabeth I until his death in 1592. Sir Roger presented two faces to the world. On the one hand, he was a stern judge, awarding harsh sentences such as fines for skipping church and tongue removal for disloyalty to the Queen. On the other hand, he was a very generous benefactor, as when he helped the poor by providing free education in Sir Roger Manwood's School, free meals at his house, and building the Hackington almshouses. Some of Roger's words on big business still resonate today, describing "...corporations that were invisible, immortal and had no soul, therefore no subpoena lieth against them, because they have no conscience..." FROM THE VICARAGE - Leaving the school where I had been working the other day, I found myself in a queue of traffic weaving past school buses, parked cars and children on their way home. I paused to give way to a car coming the other way. Just as I started to move again the car that had been behind me suddenly roared past and cut in front of me, causing me to brake hard. Of course, I soon caught up at the next set of traffic lights the other driver having gained nothing. Time is an interesting thing. We only have so much of it in this life, so perhaps it is not surprising that we hate wasting it – so much so that it can bring out the worst in us – but why is it, I wonder, that we think of time spent queuing at traffic lights or supermarket checkouts as wasted, but don't seem to mind vegetating in front of the TV or a computer screen? I have never forgotten an occasion, many years ago, when I was travelling on the London Underground. I had bought my ticket and was making my way along a passageway when I heard a train arriving. I started to run and arrived on the platform just as the doors closed and the train pulled away. In a corner of the deserted platform a door opened and a uniformed figure emerged and walked towards me. Smiling, he asked me if I was in a hurry. I replied, truthfully, that I wasn't, not really. I would only have five minutes to wait, he told me and then he asked me what I would have done with the five minutes that I would have saved if I had caught that train. I had no real answer, and as it was they were well spent talking to this wise man, whose working life was probably spent dispensing wisdom to travellers and sending them safely on their way. Jesus once made a similar point by telling a story about a rich man who planned to build bigger barns in which to store his wealth, not knowing that his time had run out and his plans were therefore pointless. Whenever I catch myself hurrying, I think of that day on the Underground, and the question that I couldn't answer. And then, usually, I slow down a bit. Brian Williams

**TIPS FOR JULY:** Such a windy June has meant that many plants need to be checked, tied in or staked, especially any that have grown vigorously. Gladioli need to be staked individually, as might lupins. Spring-flowering shrubs such

as forsythia and philadelphus should be pruned - lilacs, paeonies, rhododendrons need to be deadheaded. Hedges may need a light trim, also topiary shaped box. Break off all side shoots as tomato plants grow and feed weekly. Soft fruit such as gooseberries, currants and raspberries should be ready, and may need netting to keep birds away, and can be pruned after picking. Try to keep on top of the weeding, feeding and watering - and remember surplus plants can be taken to the Village Fete in the morning for pricing on the plant stall - and prepare your prize vegetables for the Show. **Janet Adamson**

OZ's daughter writes - June 8th this year saw the centenary of the death of Emily Davison, from injuries she received running out in front of the King's horse at Epsom, and it's an important anniversary that doesn't deserve to pass unnoticed. She may not have intended to kill herself, and there's still some debate about whether her actions helped or harmed the women's suffrage movement, but her death was a significant milestone, nonetheless. Many people believe that women achieved suffrage in 1918 but that's only partially true; because of the heavy losses we sustained in WWI, women would have significantly outnumbered men at the polling stations, and that would never have done. So suffrage was limited to women over 30 with property – in their own right or by marriage. Women didn't achieve full suffrage until 1928. One hundred years on, and the question is not so much, "Am I allowed to vote?" as "Can I be bothered?" And that's pretty understandable. This may not be the political landscape the Suffragettes envisaged us voting in, but we are still lucky enough to have the vote, and that right was won for us with blood, sweat and tears. That's why I was delighted when my friend, a newly elected councillor, told me that all the election candidates have to gather round to hear the spoilt papers read out. I once wrote a diatribe on mine, and I hope that even if I failed to shame the candidates, I at least bored them to tears. Staying at home achieves little; it just gives the politicians the mandate to do as they please, knowing they'll hear nothing more than a whimper in return. If you can't decide who to vote for, spoil your paper! And take pleasure in knowing the candidates will, quite literally, have to listen. Catherine del Campo


#### ALKHAM VALLEY HISTORICAL RESEARCH GROUP

On Saturday 29th June, the AVHRG group will undertake a noninvasive geophysical survey over Vicarage Meadow in Alkham. The aim of the investigation is to scan the area for potential archaeology and more specifically, to search for possible remains of a former river landing stage that may once existed alongside the ancient banks of the Nailbourne. After the Romans left Britain, the Roman road system was not maintained and eventually many roads degraded and fell-out of use. It was not until the 1800s that any concerted effort was made to build or repair roads. Since the 5th century and until modern times, the transport of quantities of goods to and from many locations in Kent would wherever possible, have been by water. Many of the interconnecting land routes of communication between villages and towns, at best in the summer would have been holed and rutted and impassable by wagons and carts in the winter months. The Kent river system over the centuries has either dried-up or been reduced to mere dykes because of a number of geological and man-made reasons. Hundreds of years ago they provided a safe and more commercially viable way of transporting goods inland between the settlements of Britain and the continent. OZ on COCKCHAFERS - The late arrival of summer this year has already disrupted the natural calendar, from the absence of ladybirds in May to the widespread cancellation of rose shows in mid-June. Another such delay emerged at the start of June when my son-in-law reported seeing his first cockchafer this year. These beetles usually appear at the end of April and live throughout May, giving them the alternative name of 'Maybug' (not to be confused with the Stag Beetle, also known as May Bug.) Other names in English are 'billy witch', 'mitchamador', or 'spang beetle', while my son-in-law's Spanish family know it as 'obejorro.' The Latin name is Melolontha melolontha, meaning 'apple tree blossom', perhaps one of the beetle's foods, although the acknowledged favourite is oak leaves. Cockchafer means in Middle English 'little man who gnaws' and they certainly do, swarming round trees and bushes as they devour the leaves. The larvae, known as 'chafer grubs', are equally voracious, eating the roots of potatoes and similar crops. Cockchafers are present right across Europe, and over the centuries various attempts were made to control their numbers. In mediaeval times the only method available was direct physical destruction of adult beetles so as to break the reproductive cycle. Remarkably, in France in 1320, cockchafers ('hannetons' over there) were put on trial and ordered to move to a designated area. When they 'refused' they were rounded up and executed. In other countries, cockchafers were simply cooked and eaten. In 20th century Europe, pesticides were very effective in controlling numbers, to the extent that the cockchafer neared extinction in some areas. However, over the last 40 years pesticides have given way to biological remedies and numbers are once again increasing. I think it's time to dig out the recipe for sugar-coated cockchafers. (Steve Osborn)

IN LAST MONTH'S Newsletter there was a partial report by the Alkham Valley Historical Research Group regarding a possible landing stage at Alkham. They have just done a survey of the village green to find out as there could have been a landing stage because the Alkham Valley Nailbourne, that now only runs during extended periods of wet weather, may have been at a best guess about 8 metres (30ft) wide and 2.2 metres (10ft) deep in ancient times. This volume of water would have enabled shallow draft vessels to navigate into the hinterland via Dover and Kearsney upstream to at least the village of Alkham if not further beyond. 

FROM THE VICARAGE - A couple came to see me about being married in one of our churches recently. One of them used to live in the area, and so they had come to me - but that was partly because when they had first telephoned their local parish the person taking the call had come across as abrupt, and they hadn't wanted to go back to them. I was surprised, because I know the person in guestion to be a warm, friendly soul who would do anything for anybody - but we all know how it is when the phone rings just as dinner is ready, or when we have just got out of the shower. I made a mental note to be more conscious of how I answer the phone - it just goes to show how first impressions count. I have had to remember this myself when answering the phone during the past week. Colds make me grumpy, and things that don't usually bother me become irritating. It began last weekend with a tickle at the back of the throat and by midweek I was already onto my second box of tissues. During my student days I attended a church in London. In those days large parishes often had a vicar and two curates, and there they were all single and shared a vicarage with a housekeeper, rather like TV's Father Ted - except that this housekeeper, unlike the cheery Mrs Doyle, was a retired hospital matron who meant well but could nevertheless reduce anyone who rang the vicarage doorbell to jelly in seconds. I once mentioned in front of her that colds make me grumpy. "That's because you're a man!" she thundered. "Men think it's beneath their dignity to have colds!" Jesus once went to dinner with friends. While Mary sat listening to Jesus, her sister Martha was preparing dinner, fretting about all she had to do – until she finally lost patience and complained. "You are worried and distracted by many things," Jesus replied. "There is need of only one thing." Martha reminds me of myself with a cold. If she did have one it might explain why she was fretting, and why Jesus had to remind her - and us - not to worry about the little things in life that don't matter as much as we might think they do. HOUSES OF ALKHAM - When space permits details about some of the



older properties in Alkham will be printed.

THE OLD POST OFFICE - Records show that a lease was taken on the land at the bottom of Slip Lane in 1810 and in 1877 Thomas Tunbridge applied for a mortgage. It is probable that the front house half of the house was built around this time with a cat slide roof. At a later date the rear half was added which accounts for the double pitched roof. In 1925 a further mortgage was taken out and this is probably when the shop was built, later to become the post office with a telephone box at the front. The stock was stored in the cellar under the shop and the cellar doors can still be seen by the post box on Slip Lane. Behind the house were a number of buildings, which included stables where horses used for transport were changed or watered. Before WWII the house was coated in pebble dash to reduce the fire risk. Most houses had to use the village well but the post office had its own well which survives to the present day. In 1958 John Luxton bought the property and when he retired built the bungalow called Meadowside in the rear garden. Until 1990 there was a squawk box in the shop where a message would be sent if the Russians were going to attack. Should that have happened rockets (fireworks) would have been let off in the back garden to warn the village. The shop finally closed in 1978. In the foreground of the picture are the thatched barns which were part of Halton Court Farm. Editor

We meet at 'Bramhall', Alkham Valley Road on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> September, from 7.00p.m. The earlier start gives us more time to admire the garden and views of the valley. All welcome.



JOBS FOR SEPTEMBER - This is harvest time for many of the vegetable crops: melons, tomatoes, sweet corn, runner beans and marrows. The shortening daylight hours make us feel that autumn is well on the way. Plums, damsons

and some apples and pears can be picked. Those for storage should be picked in cool conditions, stored in trays in a frost free shed. The fruit trees can then be summer pruned. Blackberries and loganberries can be harvested, with the fruiting growth being cut out and new shoots tied in. Once it has rained, lawns can be aerated and scarified to remove debris. Worn patches can be reseeded and autumn fertiliser applied. Summer bedding can gradually be removed and spaces filled with daffodil and hyacinth bulbs - also pots of bulbs to flower at Christmas can be started. In the greenhouse, any shading used can be removed as well as spent plants to allow more light. Cuttings can be taken of fuchsias and pelargoniums. Fish in garden ponds should be fed as live food becomes more scarce. Janet Adamson

OZ on OGBURN - Many years ago, just before I retired from an authority undergoing continual reorganization, downsizing and outsourcing in preparation for privatization, we kept our morale high by circulating subversive comments and/or pinning them on staff notice boards. One such read as follows: "We trained hard, but it seemed that every time we were beginning to form up into teams we would be reorganized. I was to learn later in life that we tend to meet any new situation by reorganizing; and a wonderful method it can be for creating the illusion of progress while producing confusion, inefficiency, and demoralization." This quotation was attributed to Gaius Petronius Arbiter (27AD - 66 AD), a Roman writer and courtier during the reign of Nero. As it seemed to strike such a chord with us from nearly 2,000 years ago a colleague invited me to verify its source. Over the last fifteen years I discovered that the Petronius attribution was widely regarded as a spoof, but found no evidence of the true author. The other day, I Googled it again for old time's sake, and Wikipedia came up with the answer. Charlton Ogburn, Jr. (1911-1998), was an American writer and journalist who joined military intelligence in World War II, became a captain, and worked for the US State Department after the war. In 1957 he wrote an article for Harper's Magazine entitled Merrill's Marauders, a first-hand account of the Burma Campaign, that contained the 'Petronius' lines, presumably commenting on the military hierarchy. Harper then gave him a contract for the book The Marauders, published in 1959, allowing him to be a full-time writer. Amongst other things, Ogburn was an authority on Oxfordian Theory, but surely now is the time for his name to be attached to the glorious 'Petronius' quotation. (Steve Osborn)

Peter, one of the leaders of the Church, told them that it was to do with Jesus - they had killed him, God had raised him from the dead. But Peter had the answer to a problem they didn't know they had, and apparently once they had heard his sermon about 3000 of them joined. None of my sermons has ever had guite the same effect as that, but then so far the crowds that flock to hear them have been rather smaller than the crowd that Peter preached to that day - much smaller, in fact. Someone asked me if I ever get discouraged. I hope not – because I remember that Jesus had the same problem with dwindling congregations. It seems that at one point huge crowds followed him - until he explained to them what they had to do to be his followers. When many of them left, he asked his disciples if they were going to leave too. Peter replied that there was nobody else for them to go to - his words were words of eternal life. Jesus, they realised, was the answer to problems that others didn't know they had. So as long as the Church keeps offering answers to problems that people don't necessarily know that they have, I think we might be doing OK. Brian Williams

Gardening tasks for October: We hope for a mellow Indian summer to start tidying up the garden. Autumn digging is a priority to take maximum benefit from winter frosts that break down the soil into good condition for spring planting. Summer

bedding should be removed, and bulb planting completed. Old plants in a herbaceous border should be divided and the vigorous outer shoots replanted. Dahlias should have the top growth removed as soon as blackened by frost - if lifting, store in a frost free shed, covering with damp peat (we leave them in the ground and cover with a thick layer of compost). Harvest the last of the tomatoes and ripen green ones indoors. Marrows, pumpkins and squashes should be cut and stored in a frost-proof place. Leaves should be raked up and stored as mulch. Janet

# HISTORIC HOUSES OF ALKHAM. HALTON COURT

Halton Manor was owned by noblemen from the 15<sup>th</sup> century with the Earl of Radnor being the last entitled owner. The barons

collected their dues for the manor at the court, which was originally held in Halton Forstall with the Courts Baron sometimes taking refreshment at the adjacent hostelry, now called the Marquis. In time the dues were collected at Halton Court, which was originally built in the 14<sup>th</sup> century as a hall house having a central fire with a hole in the roof. In the 17<sup>th</sup> century the living area was reconstructed in the Dutch style with narrow bricks and later the big fireplace was added with moulded stone jambs. In 1740 the front wall, which became unstable, was rebuilt with iron ties and some of the workmen's dated initials can be seen cut into the bricks. The farm had numerous outbuildings which included a timber thatched barn and a brick and flint tiled

wagon lodge and owned acres of arable land. The photo above was taken in 1959 and shows Halton Court with a bus in front of its cowshed with barns to the right. In the 1960's, as was the case with Norton Farm, the land adjacent to the house was sold as building plots. Halton Court is now a listed building and has a plaque denoting it as a 'Historical House of Kent'. Editor from Sue Lee's archive



OZ on INDIAN SUMMER - On 2 September the Met Office announced that the weather during June, July and August made 2013 one of Britain's top ten summers since records began in 1910. This, combined with the summer's late start and continuation into September, has caused much talk of an 'Indian summer.' It's a misnomer so far, as 'Indian summer' refers properly to a prolonged warm spell only after the first sharp frosts, usually between October and November. All my life I've assumed that the term 'Indian summer' originated in the Anglo-Indian sub-continent, and it was only when I couldn't find it in my Hobson-Jobson that I looked further afield. It comes in fact from North America, and is thought to describe the ideal warm conditions in autumn when native American Indians preferred to hunt. The first reference to it in the Oxford English Dictionary is from 1794, when E Denny wrote in his journal "Oct 13th. Pleasant weather. The Indian summer here." In English-speaking countries the previous names for this season were 'St Martin's Summer', 'St Luke's Summer', or 'All Halloween Summer.' In Welsh, it is 'Haf Bach Mihangel' meaning 'St Michael's Little Summer.' Across Western Europe, the names are generally translations of the above four saints, while in Eastern Europe they are variant translations of 'Old Ladies' Summer' or 'Gypsy Christmas.' China has probably the most vivid name of 'qiu laohu' meaning 'tiger in autumn.' Hot autumn weather can occur with the remains of Atlantic hurricanes bringing warmth from the tropics towards us, as is happening now, but predicting Indian summers is not easy and we may still be surprised one way or the other. As Grace Metalious said in her notorious 1956 novel Peyton Place "Indian summer is like a woman. Ripe, hotly passionate, but fickle." Steve Osborn

FROM THE VICARAGE - "We haven't seen you!" she said. Then she walked away, without introducing herself. It sounded - and felt - like criticism. I was evidently going wrong somewhere, and I wondered what I could do to put things right. I told one of our churchwardens that apparently I was not as visible locally as some might like. "Ah!" he said, "Your predecessors have all been keen dog walkers." Since moving in we have acquired a cat, but if she catches me leaving the house she sometimes follows me along the pavement, crying for me to come home - so she's no help. Next I spoke to someone at the Capel Farmers' Market. I explained the problem – no dog. "But I see you all the time!" she smiled reassuringly. I asked her advice: should I just walk around without a dog, greeting people? She seemed to think that some people might find that strange, so not a good idea. I was still stuck when a few days later I found a book called The Country Vicar in my office. I bought it a while ago - perhaps this would explain what people should expect, and what I should be doing. So I started to read it again. George Herbert, a seventeenth century courtier and poet turned vicar, wrote a book called The Country Parson. He describes a parson as, ideally, one who treats his flock like a father treats his children - he knows evervone, visits them, takes an interest in them and lots, lots more. As Vicar to about two hundred mainly poor and illiterate farm labourers in Bemerton, Wiltshire, Herbert tried to live up to all this, as have many vicars since, but sadly died after just three years in the job. The world has moved on since Herbert's time. Just as the village policeman who walked his beat, knew everybody and clipped the ears of boys who scrumped apples is now just a fond memory, so too is Herbert's Country Parson - though understandably many still wish that vicars were just like that. Today, a police officer's tools are radios and patrol cars. Today most vicars have more than one parish, mounds of paperwork, inboxes heaving with emails and telephones that keep ringing (eight calls since I sat down to write this!) Unlike Herbert's flock, their parishioners can now read, drive cars, watch TV, and use computers. I read on, and realised that whatever I do I can't win - I'm never going to match George Herbert's ideal parson. But never mind, because neither will anybody else. So I'll just do my best, like the rest. So you might just see me in the pub, despite what Herbert said about parsons and alehouses. Actually, you may well see me out walking, perhaps even being followed by a cat. But just as the police are now only a phone call away, so too is this particular country parson. 

GARDENING TIPS FOR NOVEMBER - Time to continue with the pre-winter clear up including digging as vegetables are harvested and cleared, and raking up leaves. Brassicas still

To enhance the lack of sunlight, wash and keep clean the glass on greenhouses. This is the best time to plant rose bushes, fruit trees and herbaceous perennials. Ensure bulbs being forced in pots do not dry out. Sow broad beans for an early crop next year; onion sets can also be planted. #### HISTORIC HOUSES OF ALKHAM - FORSTAL COTTAGE

The picture on the right, which is a water colour from the 19th century, shows the properties which will be later called the Marquis and **Forstal** Cottage. In between these two properties is the village well where locals went to collect their water. It can that Forstal be seen Cottage did have roofs of



different heights as it was more than one property. The part with the lower roof was the first to be built in the 17<sup>th</sup> century and became an early public house called the Fox and Goose with a blacksmith's plus a barn and stable to the rear where school cottages now stand. In the 1780's, when the pub had closed, the part with the higher roof was



built of brick and the whole made into two properties later to be known as **Shoemakers** Cottage as shoemakers lived there. The two houses were made into one in the late 1960's by the wife of James Robertson Justice, a famous film actor, who then lived in the property.

OZ on FRUIT FLIES – For weeks now I've suffered ever-increasing swarms of tiny flies, and at times have blamed myself for sloppy kitchen hygiene. That may well be part of the cause, but I was relieved to discover that the problem has been shared with the whole country in this year's wild weather extremes. It seems that the cold spring, high summer temperatures and heavy autumn rain have created the ideal conditions for these busy little creatures. They feed on fermenting fruit, and the importance of this is reflected in their scientific name, Drosophila malanogaster, from the Greek for 'darkbellied dew lover' (drosia = dew, philia = love, malano = darkcoloured, gaster = belly). Beware confusion with three other insects called 'fruit fly': Asian Fruit Fly (Drosophila suzukii); Olive Fruit Fly (Bactrocera oleae); and Mediterranean Fruit Fly (Ceratitis capitata). Our Common Fruit Fly, Drosophila malanogaster, has a complete life cycle of seven days, and so has produced many generations this year, time which has been spent feeding on fruit, vegetables, wine dregs, both indoors and outside, and latterly on compost heaps, wet from the autumn rains. They are extremely athletic creatures, flapping their wings at over 220 beats per second and capable of rotating 90 degrees in less than 1/40 of a second. Fruit flies live in a close symbiotic relationship with humans and, amazingly, share 75% of human disease genes. For this reason they are used extensively nowadays in medical research into aging, immunity, diabetes and cancer, amongst other conditions. People often seek ways of destroying fruit flies, and it seems that the most reliable method is beer traps, as I recommended in this column many years ago for wasps. But why kill friendly recycling relatives? Just keep the kitchen clean and enjoy their company - outdoors! Steve Osborn

FROM THE VICARAGE - "How much does it cost?" "Nothing," I replied. Stunned silence at the other end of the phone understandably, perhaps. After all, if you want something, you usually expect to have to pay for it, and if it's any good it will cost you a fortune. No wonder that it came as a surprise to the caller to learn that their child could be christened at their local parish church without it costing them a penny. Soon the Hallowe'en displays in the shops will have been replaced by the Christmas ones. Businesses survive by providing what people want - they have to make money, and Christmas provides an opportunity to make quite a bit of it. The shops will soon be full of things that we simply must have. A while ago I read that years ago, when machines began to take over jobs that had been done by hand, there was panic. People would work less hours - so what would they do with their spare time? Then someone came up with an idea - convince them that they needed luxuries. Then they would happily go back to working long hours so that they could afford them. Perhaps that is why we are often suspicious of things that are cheap, or even free – modern living has led us to believe that such things are worthless. This might be bad news for churches, which are in the not-for-profit business of helping people to find God and reach heaven and only charge what they need to when people want their services. Children often have as much fun with cardboard boxes than the expensive toys that come in them. As Christmas approaches, it is worth confronting our obsession with spending by remembering that some of the best things in life are still cheap, if not free. Brian Williams

**GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER** - A time to clear up in the garden, whether it be clearing and composting leaves or washing labels, pots and seed trays in the shed. Gutters need to be cleared of debris and leaves, and bird boxes

should be cleaned out to provide winter shelter for small birds. Outdoor water taps need to be lagged and garden tools cleaned and oiled. Now is the time to spray fruit trees and bushes with winter wash and shorten any long growth on roses. The ground around newly planted shrubs should be covered to avoid frozen roots. Control mice if found eating broad bean seed or vegetables stored for the winter. Keep indoor pots of bulbs moist but not too hot and plant outdoors after flowering. HISTORIC HOUSES OF ALKHAM – The photo above, which was taken in the 1930's, shows part of Slip Lane with the Rectory in the top left corner. In the foreground is Box (Tree) Cottage and it can be seen that it was made up of two houses with the smaller part being built first in the 18th century. At least two families lived in the property over the years and in the late 19th century the Kirby family moved into the house. Their father reared livestock, which was slaughtered in shed to the right and butchered in the smaller house. Pam Savers says that when they moved into the house in the 1960's hooks still remained on the walls where the meat was hung for sale. Box Tree Cottage is now a charming Grade II listed building. On the right of the photo is the Wesleyan Chapel that was built in 1880 and Malmain's Farm is opposite with the dairy by the road where milk churns were

left in a hole in the wall to be collected (now a window). Adjacent to the dairy is a 2 storey granary where the grain from the farm was processed. All the properties are now private houses and further houses have been built on the land either side of Box Tree Cottage.




#### OZ on FIRST CROSSWORD - FUN'S Word-Cross Puzzle

FROM THE VICARAGE - "A ray of hope flickers in the sky, a tiny star lights up way up high..." Recognize it? Yes - the opening words of A Child is Born, a Christmas number one for Johnny Mathis in December 1976, now mainly heard when Christmas shopping. Cardinal Albino Luciani, later Pope John Paul I, wrote a monthly column in a magazine when he was a bishop in Venice. He wrote a series of open letters to all kinds of characters, from Charles Dickens to Pinocchio which were later collected and published in a little book called Illustrissimi. Someone once gave me a copy. A charming, entertaining read, it made me think – how about an open letter to Johnny Mathis? You see, I'm not a fan of the song. It begins with the excitement of a new birth – the sort of hopes that we celebrate at christenings. Then, as the orchestra takes up the melody: "All of this happens because the world is waiting, waiting for one child... that will turn hate to love, war to peace and everyone to everyone's neighbour..." Fine – Christians think that Jesus was just that. But then: "It's all a dream, an illusion now..." What? Christmas a dream, an illusion? Mr. Mathis, why did you really think that Jesus somehow wasn't up to the job? Didn't Jesus talk about loving our enemies as well as our neighbours? Is it really his fault that not everyone does that? Being only human, people don't always listen. That's the problem. St John's Gospel puts it like this: "9 The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.\*10 He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him..." So, Mr. Mathis, why not record something about that? Perhaps that would help to build the peaceful world you dream of – one where people listen. In the meantime, a very happy Christmas to you, and to everyone. Brian Williams
