#### HISTORIC PROPERTIES OF ALKHAM – THE SCHOOL



Behind the house which is now Forstal Cottage there used to be a number of small buildings, which included a blacksmith's and a barn. In 1862 these were sold and three years later Alkham school was completed, probably paid for by a government grant and administered by a voluntary body. However, by 1874 the school became a National School and can be seen in the centre of the photo above with the larger part being the headmaster's house where children also hung their clothes. At one time there were over 90 children attending the school with the bell tower on the right summoning them

to lessons. A toilet block was added at a later date and adjacent to the Forstal an air raid shelter was built in WWII. For part of the time a working men's club met in the large house after the headmaster moved out. The school closed in 1972, at which time there were 25 children attending with one full time and two part time teachers. The school was later sold and converted into three houses with garages on the playground. **editor** 



OZ on SLOE GIN - Last month, we drove to Romney Marsh for sloepicking, after friends told us of the enormous number of sloes that they had collected from the blackthorn hedges that line the ditches near St Mary's Bay. We could see where they'd been, as the bushes next to the road had been stripped bare, but even so we managed to pick enough fat sloes in two hours to make 8 pints of sloe gin. At the last bush, I leaned over the ditch and held down a branch while my partner picked the last few sloes. When I released the branch, it sprang up violently, and a thorn caught my woollen glove, projecting it gracefully through the branches in a perfect parabolic arc, to land, utterly irretrievable, in the water. So much for greed. Back indoors, we pricked and bottled the sloes, added sugar and then, as an experiment, added either gin, the French 'Alcool pour fruits', or white rum, and left it to infuse for a couple of months. When mature, it will be, as always, a gorgeous winter drink, strong and sweet with a distinctive sharp edge at the back of the tongue. No one described it better than the great Irish Poet, Seamus Heaney, in his poem Sloe Gin: "The clear weather of juniper darkened into winter. She fed gin to sloes and sealed the glass container. When I unscrewed it I smelled the disturbed tart stillness of a bush rising through the pantry. When I poured it it had a cutting edge and flamed like Betelgeuse. I drink to you in smoke-mirled, blue-black, polished sloes, bitter and dependable." (Steve Osborn)

**GARDENING TASKS FOR FEBRUARY** - Much depends on the weather as many are still clearing up from the storms of January. Broken branches should be removed from evergreen trees; shrubs should be hauled upright and

staked or heeled in. If we get mild dry weather, then deciduous trees, shrubs and hedging could be planted. Sedums and deciduous grasses can be cut down to avoid damaging early new growth later. Firm alpine plants into place, remove weed seedlings and dress soil with fine stone chippings. Complete pruning of apple and pear trees, vines and climbing roses. Sow half-hardy annual seeds under glass, also tomato seeds to be raised in a cool greenhouse. Put out seed potato tubers in trays for sprouting and store in a light frost-proof shed. Tackle small invasive weeds in flower beds, taking care not to damage emerging bulbs. Janet Adamson

ALKHAM, A BRIEF HISTORY - The Lordship of the Barony of Folkestone had original claim to this area, subordinate to which was the manor of Alkham, owned by the Malmaines family. There were other manors such as Hopton, Evering (Everden), Halton and Wolverton but over the years, because of financial pressures and other factors, they became farms. In the 19th century most of the parishioners worked on the farms and local names predominated but gradually the individual farms began to disappear. One of these was Norton Farm, which stood on the east side of Slip Lane and is shown in the photograph. In WWII the army was in residence and finally used it for machine gun practice such that the lovely period property was demolished. The house called Apple Tree was built on part of the land for the grandson of William Wordsworth, who had returned from India. Malmains Farm was owned by John Ullmann, who relished the name 'Diesel Johnny', and when he died recently some old farm buildings became houses and the land was returned to agriculture. Hogbrook Farm continued into the 1980's but an owner sold land in parts with one piece becoming Newlyns Meadow, its



name being derived from a previous farmer. Halton, Hopton and Everden are no longer farms but the beautiful houses remain and this includes Upton Farm House at South Alkham. The population of the parish has remained roughly the same over the years at about 690 but those who work do so elsewhere and the ade

range has changed significantly. editor

OZ on HOGGART – I was sorry to hear of the death from cancer last month of Simon Hoggart, the political sketch writer and columnist, who spent a long working life treating this often divisive topic with a uniquely sharp but healing humour. Simon was born on 26 May 1946 in Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire, to Richard Hoggart and his wife Mary (nee France). Richard was a highly respected academic who later became famous as author of The Uses of Literacy (1957), and was an expert witness in the Lady Chatterley's Lover trial in 1960. After education at grammar schools in Hull and Leicester, Simon taught for a year in Uganda and then followed in his father's footsteps by reading English at King's College, Cambridge. Here he became involved in journalism through the university paper, and in 1968 he was one of the two graduates recruited annually by the Manchester office of the Guardian newspaper. In 1973 the paper's parliamentary sketch writer, Norman Shrapnel, resigned, and Simon moved to the London office, starting a long career with both the Guardian and the Observer, including a spell as the latter's Washington correspondent. At the same time, he appeared on radio and TV, and wrote some 20 books on a variety of topics. His appeal was easy to understand, but difficult to emulate; he was clever but not cruel; he was not partisan, but attacked sloppy thinking wherever he found it. Two of my favourite Hoggarts are "Another day, another U-turn" and his challenging of "Now is not the time for cowardice!" with "Just when is the time for cowardice? "After a lifetime of being asked "Are you related to Richard Hoggart?" he was delighted to hear recently that someone had asked his father "Are you related to Simon Hoggart?" Alkham cricket club is the second oldest in the county and they played in the field above until 1938 when they moved to Vicarage Meadow (village green) after the dyke was dug to alleviate flooding. OZ on RAMANUJAN – This month marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the arrival in England of one of our cleverest immigrants. Srinivasa Ramanujan was born on 22 December 1887 in Erode, Madras Presidency (now Tamil Nadu), India, to a Brahmin family. Ramanujan did well at local school, coming top in his district at the age of 10, and transferred to the secondary school. Here his mathematical genius unfolded, as he raced through the school's maths books, leaving teachers and fellow pupils far behind. By his late teens, Ramanujan was working alone, discovering new theorems and re-discovering old ones. However, this obsessive searching caused him to fail two degree courses because of neglecting other subjects. He married in 1909 and worked as a clerk while continuing his research and dealing with the first of his lifelong health problems. By 1914 Ramanujan's fame was such that he was invited to England by eminent mathematicians Hardy and Littlewood to work with them at Cambridge University. Over the next 5 years Hardy and Ramanujan collaborated on an enormous amount of original research, and Ramanujan was showered with long-deserved academic gualifications. Ramanujan's illness worsened in 1919 and he returned to India, dying there on 16 April 1920, aged 32. The anecdote best illustrating Ramanujan's lightning mathematical reflex was told by George Hardy after going to visit Ramanujan when he was ill at Putney. Hardy had ridden in taxi cab number 1729 and remarked to Ramanujan that the number seemed rather a dull one, and that he hoped it was not an unfavourable omen. "No," replied Ramanujan, "it is a very interesting number; it is the smallest number expressible as the sum of two cubes in two different ways."  $(1^3 + 12^3 \text{ and } (93 + 10^3))$ . To this day 1729 is known as the Ramanujan-Hardy number. (Steve Osborn)

Reminding myself to love my neighbour as myself, I righted my neighbour's bin and picked its contents out of the road. No sooner had I finished than another terrific gust of wind blew a cloud of card and paper along the street, along with a torrent of tins and cartons. Another gust took it all either into our hedge, or across our garden. Now I had to love all of my neighbours at once. Filling a bin sack, I wondered - if I made a time capsule of my sack and buried it, what would our descendants make of our rubbish, discovering it years from now? No milk bottles, but plastic milk cartons would date the hoard AM – After Milkmen. Cat food sachets would tell their own story. But what of the dozens of yoghurt pots, their labels carefully removed, or the blister packs? A few cigarette packets and some beer cans would reveal our guilty pleasures - but our main vice would seem to be pies and cakes, nearly all from supermarkets. That packaging, and the catalogue that landed on the path, would show us to be tribe of shoppers. #### THE NAILBOURNE

An old legend goes that St Augustine's first summer in Kent was a very dry one, which started а rumour that the old gods Woden and Thunor were angry at the new religion. Augustine prayed for

rain, and where he knelt a spring came forth. The Dover Express in March 1893 said the Nailbourne last flowed in 1888 and attracted a large number of visitors and in 1901 it anticipated that owing to the sinking of a well at Drellingore, to supply the town of Folkestone, it will rise no more. There were major problems during WW1 and in 1928 Alkham Parish Council complained to Highways re-flooding and the Surveyor was ordered to construct a dyke. In 1937 Dover RDC agreed a channel should be dug about 530 yards long to connect the Nailbourne to a pond. Part of this was probably across what is now the village green as the cricket team moved there in 1938. In 1956 a teacher studied the flow of the Nailbourne and said that there were five major springs, two at Lower Standen, one at Drellingore, one at South Alkham and one at Wolverton. Lower Standen yielded over 2 million gallons in 24 hours in winter and the Drellingore well had a normal yield of more than 2.5 million gallons per day. Alkham Valley with its porous chalk is vital in providing domestic water to the surrounding area; in very wet periods the chalk becomes saturated and the Nailbourne flows. The picture above is of the Valley Road and was taken in 1937, near the current 30mph limit to the west of the village. On the right is the police house by which Valley Cottages were built in the 1946/47. From 1961 the Nailbourne ran significantly in 1974, 1987, 2001 and 2014 which appears to be a 13 year cycle but this is by no means certain. OZ on COCKNEY ALPHABET - I haven't had time this month to write the usual kind of story, but thought that readers may like to try and improve on the Cockney Alphabet popularized on BBC radio in the 1930s by the comedy duo Clapham and Dwyer. It goes as follows: A for 'orses (hay for horses); B for mutton (beef or mutton); for th' highlanders (Seaforth Highlanders); С D for 'ential (deferential); for Adam (Eve or Adam); Ε F for 'vescence (effervescence); G for police (Chief of police); H for respect (age for respect); I for Novello (Ivor Novello); J for oranges (Jaffa oranges); K for restaurant, (cafe or restaurant); L for leather (Hell for leather); M for 'sis (emphasis); N for 'adig (infra dig); O for the garden wall (over the garden wall); P for relief (pee for relief); Q for a song (cue for a song), or Q for billiards (cue for billiards) or Q for everything (queue for everything); R for mo' (half a mo'); S for you (it's for you); T for two (tea for two); U for me (you for me); V for La France (Vive La France); W for a bob (double you for a bob); X for breakfast (eggs for breakfast); Y for Gawd's sake (why, for God's sake); Z for breezes (zephyr breezes). Clapham and Dwyer later renamed it the Surrealistic Alphabet, which in my view added nothing to its appeal; the original version sounded irresistibly Cockney. However, some of the allusions seem rather dated, and some really don't work at all well and can probably be bettered. FLOOD MEETING - Speaking to people after the meeting the general impression was that they were talked down to by a couple of speakers and that the other representatives were there because they had to be. No firm proposals were given and little was achieved except to be reminded that there is no money and it's unclear as to who owns what. About 70 people came to the village hall on the 7<sup>th</sup> April to hear what representatives from KCC, DDC, Affinity Water, Southern Water, the Environment Agency and local councillors had to say about the recent flooding and their proposals to ameliorate the situation. Spirited comments were made by the audience regarding the lack of maintenance of the dyke and the lamentable size of culverts and pipes. The idea of a holding pond was summarily dismissed with one speaker saying the water would just come up further along. Since the Nailbourne rises at Standen and Drellingore this does seem unlikely although there are other natural springs. The representatives seemed pleased with themselves at the end of the meeting but this is not the end of the matter. On a positive note DDC has bid for some of the £3 million government money given to KCC after the flooding and it is recognised that Grove Ferry and Alkham were the areas worst affected in Kent. It should also be said that DDC employees worked hard during the flooding period to help the local community. editor

Another well was constructed in 1922, slightly to the west, at Lower Standen for the Folkestone and District Water Company and an excavating machine patented and made in 1919 was used. It had been designed to be used on a possible channel tunnel link to France and had a 7 foot (2.1m) rotary cutter which was powered by electricity and pushed forward by hydraulic power. The main motor was 25 horse power and the machine had a 4 foot cast steel centre carrying four steel buckets with a conveyor belt taking the chalk to spoil wagons. There were only three operatives, one at the face and two removing the spoil wagons. Chalk is a rock and at lower levels is extremely hard and because of this the cutting knives had to be constantly replaced and the blocky chalk jammed the machine. After it had dug about 200 feet (61m) along the shaft it was abandoned and is believed to still be in the disused gallery. editor details from Sue Lees

#### THE ARCHBISHOP VISITS

**ALKHAM** - In the photo on the left is the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Michael Ramsey, who walked up the Forstal in 1968 for a thanks giving service following the restoration of St. Anthony's Church. In the photo on the right, almost 50 years later on the 17th April 2014, Justin Welby walked up the Forstall to the Maundy Thursday service at St. Anthony's Church. As there were no facilities at the church, Justin Welby and his fellow clergy had changed into their vestments in Sue Lee's house at the bottom of the Forstall. The Archbishop spent Holy Week in the Dover area and visited various locations including the Emmaus Centre for the homeless at Archcliffe Fort and the Food Bank. He later carried one of three life-size crosses through the streets of Dover up to St Mary de Castro, the church in the castle, where they were planted. **editor** 

**OZ on HOGGART (2)** – An observant reader spotted that the final sentence of my February article suggested that Simon Hoggart's father Richard was already dead. In fact Richard outlived Simon by some three months, dying aged 95 on April 10 2014. Some of the following necessarily repeats facts in the February article. Richard was a highly respected academic who became famous as author of The Uses of Literacy (1957), and expert witness in the Lady Chatterley's Lover trial in 1960. He was born to a soldier and house painter on September 24 1918 in Potternewton, Leeds, and raised by his grandmother in Hunslet after both parents died. After studying at Cockburn High School, Richard read English at Leeds University. During World War II, he served in the Royal Artillery in North Africa and Italy. There followed a thirteen year period when Richard built his career lecturing at Hull University. His reputation was finally established in 1957, with the publication of The Uses of Literacy, in which he used his own experiences to comment on the conflict between traditional British working class culture and the radical new Americanised culture of the Fifties. In 1959 he moved to Leicester University, and in 1960 was called as a defence witness at the Lady Chatterley's Lover trial, during which the chief prosecutor famously asked the jury if the book were the "kind of book you would wish your wife or servants to read." Richard was invited to Birmingham University in 1962, where he founded the Centre for Contemporary Cultural Studies, and then worked at UNESCO for five years. On his return he became Warden of Goldsmith's College, London, where he stayed until retirement. Richard and Simon Hoggart – a brilliant father and son. I can now repeat February's final line without any ambiguity. They'll both be greatly missed. (Steve Osborn)

FROM THE VICARAGE - Dear Friends; using a computer is like driving a car. Both offer opportunities to explore the world – but first you have to get them to start. For a while I taught computing, encouraging young people to learn how to drive computers so that they could use them to explore the world, rather than merely to amuse themselves. Too often they often settled for merely amusing themselves. Has technology made life better? You may well ask. E-mail, for instance, has caught on to the extent that in the USA some workers spend the equivalent of two working days each week just checking, writing and reading e-mails, slaves to a monster that once promised to make life easier! Easter continues through May, Christians recalling how God surprised Jesus' followers by raising Jesus to life, and again at Pentecost by sending his Holy Spirit upon them. In the New Testament Book of Acts Peter, on the Day of Pentecost, explains this to the crowds. It ends with the crowds asking Peter what they must do about it. He replies that they must repent, be baptised, and receive the Holy Spirit. Technology easily takes on a life of its own. It makes all kinds of things possible - and with it comes the temptation to just use technology for its own sake, rather than using it to make the world a better place. For Christians our world, filled as it is with technology, is the same one that Christ died for and in which his Spirit lives and in which God can still spring surprises. Nothing has ever been invented that can compete with repentance, baptism, and the gift of the Holy Spirit for power to change the world for the better. Brian Williams

SOMME TRIP - As part of the village's commemorations of the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War, 47 people travelled to the Somme to commemorate two of the villagers who were killed there. The first stop was at the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme where, amongst the 73,000 names, is

that of John Rye who was killed, aged 24, in the Battle of Flers-Courcelette. The memorial has a sobering effect on most visitors. The panels bearing the names overwhelm as they tower above you and surround you and your own sense of being is diminished in the presence of this catalogue of suffering and by the knowledge that each name represents the loss of life of an individual and heartbreak and misery for those left behind. We gathered at John Rye's inscription to hear a little about his life and death and Richard Tapsell laid a wreath in remembrance. A picnic lunch followed and thanks must go to Helen Scopes who organised this for us; everyone was well fed and full of admiration for the appearance of such a spread from such a small box! The second stop was at La Boiselle to see the Lochnagar Crater. Blown on the first day of the Somme the hole in the ground, which still remains, is evidence of some of the destructive power that was unleashed. A truly terrifying prospect now but even more so for the men who had to advance towards it across open fields and through machine gun fire a hundred years ago! The final stop was at Bullecourt where we commemorated villager Edward Collard. We stopped outside the village to appreciate again how flat and open the land is that Edward and his colleagues had to cross. Pam Sayers laid a wreath in Edward's memory (see photo) and it would have been hard not to have felt a connection to the man being at the spot of his death on the 97th anniversary. A full day which highlighted the enormity of the slaughter and also, through the village connections, the personal scale of loss. Thanks to Den Barnard for his help in making the trip happen and to those who came with us. "When you go home, tell them of us and say "For their tomorrow, we gave our today" (John Maxwell Edmonds). Mark Robson PIMLICO - Local archaeologists are surveying Pimlico Way Vineyard paying particular attention to the byway and bomb craters. Martin Scherer, who owns the land at South Alkham, has been confidently advised that the craters were caused by WW2 bombs, not flint mining, because of the bowl shape. The archaeologists will return when the bottom field is ploughed. If there are any significant finds they will go to a local museum, if possible after display in Alkham.

**ALKHAM W.I.** - A quiet meeting due to a number of members visiting the Somme. Those members present discussed a W.I. resolution on organ donation and this was followed by a quiz organized by Debbie Saunders and Debbie Griggs; congratulations to the winning teams who came joint first and not forgetting the team that came second. Next meeting is on 10<sup>th</sup> June 7.30pm when we will be entertained by Martyn Harrison, who is an excellent tenor, singing just one cornetto. Everybody welcome. **WELL** – In last month's Newsletter there was an article about a machine that was abandoned in a well near Lower Standen in 1922. John Richards emailed to say that he can recall his father speaking of it as he worked there. The bucket routinely stopped half way down when it was possible to phone the donkey engine operative. John went down the well as an 8 year old, which was pretty brave. There has also been some correspondence about the natural spring being called the nailbourne. The word appears in an old dictionary and the definition is that it is a natural spring that flows when the water table is high. It is a word that is used in other areas and therefore should be prefixed with the location. The one that flows through Alkham should be referred to as the Drellingore nailbourne or in some correspondence simply as the Drellingore. **editor** 

**OZ on THE BARD** – In these columns I try to avoid the well-known in favour of more obscure corners, in the spirit of "Not many people know that." However, I can't let this April's 450th anniversary of William Shakespeare's birth pass unnoticed. Little is known of his early years except that he was baptised in Stratford-upon-Avon on 26 April 1564. His birth is popularly celebrated on 23 April, because that is St George's Day, and he died in 1616, also on 23 April, the day after the great Spanish writer Miguel Cervantes. In addition to 38 plays and some 165 poems, Shakespeare is also famous for the number of new words he added to the English language. During the 200 years from about 1500 onwards, England was changing rapidly under the combined influences of religion, science, exploration and war, and the language needed new words, some of which were imported from foreign languages. It fell to the writers of the age to absorb these words or create new ones, a process called 'neologizing', and Shakespeare became the greatest of the neologizers. Computer analysis shows that Shakespeare's works have a vocabulary of 17,677 words, around 10% of which were first used by him. They include: new meanings of old words; new words, such as 'lewdster'; 'un-' words as in the verb 'to unhappy'; and compound words such as 'archvillain'. These days, we're very sniffy about the practice of turning nouns into verbs, as in the phrase 'to action' something, so it comes as a salutary surprise to discover how often Shakespeare did the same, as when he invented the verb 'to blanket'. One of his words that unsurprisingly didn't take off is 'anthropophaginian', meaning 'cannibal'. Here I have to confess that my favourite Shakespeare word is the politically incorrect, but very funny, 'kickie-wickie' for wife. Steve Osborn

the back of the church - large black letters printed on white card, propped against the wall. Who had put it there - and why? What was the story behind it - and did it belong in church? What was I to do with it? Eventually the mystery was solved, and the explanation turned out to be simpler than I had at first thought - but it did make me think. Why LIVE AND LET LIVE? At first sight, it's not that different to something Jesus said. Don't judge or condemn others, and you won't be judged or condemned yourself. Great, if that's what LIVE AND LET LIVE really means. Or is it just about me getting on with my life while others get on with theirs? Is that what it means? Jesus once answered a question with a story about a victim of crime left for dead at the roadside. LIVE AND LET LIVE could have been the motto of the two outwardly respectable people who passed by, not doing any harm, but not doing any good either. The unlikely hero of Jesus' story would not usually have been the sort to stop and help, but nevertheless he did. 'Who is my neighbour?' That's what Jesus had been asked - his point being that the world is a better place when treat others as we would like to be treated ourselves. So I have removed the sign, and it is waiting for its owner to collect it. Why? Well, the trouble with LIVE AND LET LIVE is that it leaves my neighbour a victim - friendless, destitute, and bleeding at the roadside. If we're serious about making the world a better place, we're going to have to treat our neighbours better than that. Brian

PIMPICO WAY - On Sunday 18th and 25th May, members of the White Cliffs Metal Detecting Club based in Alkham village hall, detected land owned by Martin Scherer at Pimlico, south Alkham. The on-going surveys of land in the Alkham valley, under the direction of Vince Burrows, forms part of the extensive historical, geophysical and archaeological investigations by the Alkham Valley Historical Research Group. Finds recovered from Pimlico, despite hard undisturbed ground, by the group include: A Georgian coin dated 1806; trade tokens dated 1607-1667; five late medieval spectacle shoe-buckles; musket and pistol shot; a 16th century clothing fastener; a small casket key dating between 1350-1450; a Crotal bell and a lead seal dating between 18-1900s. Most of the items so far recovered date between 1600-1900. Our aim is to record as much background historical material as possible. This will allow us to collate and understand ancient occupation and the use of the land throughout the centuries within the valley and generally around the North Downs. The metal detecting surveys are organised events that operate under the Countryside codes, archaeological recording codes of practice (Portable Antiquities Scheme) and the Treasure Act 1996. Should items of high values be recovered, landowners are entitled to market value rewards under the Treasure Act. The Alkham Valley Historical Research Group would like to hear from interested landowners for surveys on their land after harvest time. When he was fifteen Joseph was working on a nearby farm, but in 1914 enlisted as a driver in the Army Service Corp. He first saw active service on the 11<sup>th</sup> October 1914 in France; however later in the war he was exposed to gas and was discharged as medically unfit. In 1918, as a war pensioner, he was employed as a War Goods Inspector in Salford, near Manchester, where he married Edith Bailey. Edith's parents ran the Carpenters Arms public house on Meggett Lane in South Alkham and lost their son George, who was killed in the war. Sadly, two weeks after his wedding in St. Anthony's church Joseph also died, with his wife at his side. His death was probably due to the Spanish flu, which caused more fatalities than WWI. Joseph's body

was brought back to Alkham and he was buried on 15<sup>th</sup> October 1918 at St. Anthony's church where his gravestone is a short distance from the war memorial on which both his and George Bailey's name are inscribed. **editor** - article based on information provided by Mark Robson – see also the 'Alkham Heroes' page on <u>www.alkham.org</u>



OZ on W ..... R – Last winter was remarkable for

its unusually warm, wet, windy weather. Due mainly to the warmth and the consequential lower incidence of ice, snow, falls, 'flu and breathing problems, the UK mortality rate was its lowest for five years. Between 1 December 2013 and 15 March 2014, 10,881 (6.7%) fewer people died in England and Wales than in the same period last year. The winter was the warmest, at 5.2° C average, since 1989, when the average was 5.8° C. It was the wettest since 1766, with almost double the average rainfall in south-eastern and central south England. It was also the windiest, with the most number of severe gale days since 1871. The Met Office has linked these events to disturbances in the Atlantic and Pacific jet streams following heavy rainfall over the West Pacific last year. We took a big trip down under in February and March, and found that the South Pacific was also affected, as a cyclone was on its way. Singapore was its usual sticky self, with both humidity and Fahrenheit temperature at 92. Temperatures in Australia were high, as normal in February. At Port Douglas the temperature reached 44°C and plastic bottles were melting on the beach. When we drove the campervan up through New Zealand in March, the cyclone approached, circled, dumping rain and gales on us, and then drifted away into the Pacific, leaving us deliciously sunny autumn weather. What we'd planned, after two months sunshine down under, was a classic English summer, which seems to be a strong possibility this year, according to the Met Office. Will it happen? As A P Herbert wrote 70 years under the title THE W. . . . . R: "I think I mentioned June the other week: About July I simply cannot speak." (Steve Osborn)

# FLOODING OF ALKHAM – I have been asked to print this open letter from Geoff Hillier to Alkham Parish Council.

In February of this year a petition was signed by 60 parishioners and was sent, amongst others, to our local MP and our Parish Council, calling for consideration to be given to the building of a Detaining Pond on Affinity Water owned land to the South West of the Village, to hold back excessive water at times when the Drellingore Nailbourne runs. This suggestion was favourably received by our MP. At the Parish Council meeting held in the Village Hall in March, this matter was discussed and the Parish Council Chairman withdrew from the discussion, declaring a personal conflict of interest with such a suggestion. There is to be a meeting convened at which Kent County Council, The Environment Agency, and others will attend to discuss what actions can be taken to alleviate the flood risk to Alkham. The Parish Council Chairman will also attend this meeting. In light of the declared 'personal conflict of interest' by the Chairman, it is felt that his views could be compromised and therefore not represent, impartially, the expressed views of the parishioners. In view of this we respectfully ask the Chairman to stand down from any meetings or discussions on the matter of flood alleviation and appoint another Parish Council Member to attend and dutifully represent the Parish interest as a whole. It is felt that all such meetings which affect the whole village should be open, and attendance available to all interested parties. Failing this, the village should have at least an unbiased representative, from the public, present as an observer to be able to report back impartially to the village through the Newsletter. A suggestion is that flashing yellow lights should be fitted to the warning signs on the Alkham Valley Road which would only be activated by high vehicles.

A THANKFUL VILLAGE is one in which all the men who went to war from that village in WW1 survived. There are 32 such villages in England and Wales, Scotland and Ireland having none. The only village in Kent is Knowlton, which is 13 miles from Alkham and lies to the west of Betteshanger

and Eastry. Knowlton had a population of 39 with 12 men enlisting and because of this they won a competition in 1915 as the bravest village. Knowlton was actually an estate and few people lived there but it has an estate church which is now redundant but under the care of the Churches Conservation Trust and open to the public. Alkham was not a Thankful Village with 16 of its men being killed in WW1. The number of people in the right age group in the Alkham Parish at the time was about 300 so there was probably about 150 males who could have enlisted or been conscripted. If anyone has further details about the number of men from Alkham who fought in WW1 please contact the Newsletter (details on front and back page). **editor** 

**OZ on TIPPERARY** – Last month we sang in the Dover Proms Concert, which included songs from World War One to mark its centenary. The song that stayed in my head for days afterwards was "It's a Long Way to Tipperary", and there's quite a story behind it. It was written by Jack Judge and Harry Williams in 1909 as a music hall song entitled "It's a Long Way to Connemara", later changed to "...Tipperary", as that was where Judge's Irish grandparents lived. It was first noted as a marching song on 13 August 1914 by a Daily Mail reporter, who watched the Irishmen of the 2nd Connaught Rangers singing it as they marched into Boulogne, welcomed by cheering French crowds. The battalion was part of the British Expeditionary Force, and the song was soon adopted as a marching song by other British units. By the end of 1914 it had become popular worldwide, following a recording by the Irish tenor John McCormack, and soon German and Russian troops had developed their own versions. The song's popularity continued in peacetime, but Judge and Williams didn't benefit equally. Initially they had shared royalties 50/50, but in 1915 Judge needed money to settle debts and he secured it by selling his royalties to Williams. After the war, moved by stories of the song's importance to the troops, Williams gave £1,000 (£65,000 in today's money) to the Great War Injured Beneficiary Fund. Williams died in 1924, and his royalties are still earning over £30,000 a year. Before Judge died, in 1938, he wrote a sequel called "It's a Long Way No Longer", the words of which were lost. It's a pity, as it could well have been a fitting tribute to the ever-loved and much sung "It's a Long Way to Tipperary". (Steve Osborn)

From The Vicarage - Using a computer is like driving a car. Both offer opportunities to explore the world - but first you have to get them to start. For a while I taught computing, encouraging young people to learn how to drive computers so that they could use them to explore the world, rather than merely to amuse themselves. Too often they often settled for merely amusing themselves. Has technology made life better? You may well ask. E-mail, for instance, has caught on to the extent that in the USA some workers spend the equivalent of two working days each week just checking, writing and reading e-mails, slaves to a monster that once promised to make life easier! Easter continues through May, Christians recalling how God surprised Jesus' followers by raising Jesus to life, and again at Pentecost by sending his Holy Spirit upon them. In the New Testament Book of Acts Peter, on the Day of Pentecost, explains this to the crowds. It ends with the crowds asking Peter what they must do about it. He replies that they must repent, be baptised, and receive the Holy Spirit. Technology easily takes on a life of its own. It makes all kinds of things possible – and with it comes the temptation to just use technology for its own sake, rather than using it to make the world a better place. For Christians our world, filled as it is with technology, is the same one that Christ died for and in which his Spirit lives and in which God can still spring surprises. Nothing has ever been invented that can compete with repentance, baptism, and the gift of the Holy Spirit for power to change the world for the better. **Brian Williams**

North Chapel was an excellent example of our local artists led by Jo O'Shea. On Saturday evening in the Village Hall Den Barnard and Mark Robson presented an informative and moving series of talks, illustrated by projected images of historic photographs, recounting the build up to the First World War, its impact on the world and subsequent horrific events that have taken place despite it having been supposedly The War to End All Wars. The talks were supported by readings given of WW1 poems, and other powerful statements made by influential figures of the day. During the interval those present were able to view contemporary newspapers, photographs, and artefacts displayed in the hall. A biography of each of the Alkham 16 heroes was given concluding what had been a very moving experience for all. The Sunday church service concluded the week's imaginative and so well presented commemorative events for which every villager can be proud. ALKHAM HEROES - The First World War was to make itself felt in the village only 41 days after it was declared when Charles (Charlie) Grainger was killed on September 14th. Charlie was the son of Richard (Insurance Agent) and Sarah Grainger of Pimlico, South Alkham.

Charlie was one of the 'Old Contemptibles', the original British Expeditionary Force, sent to France at the outbreak of The Great War. He served as a Private in the 1st Battalion, The Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. Charlie has no known grave and is remembered with honour at the La Ferte-Sous-Jouarre Memorial, Seine-et-Marne, France. Eight days later the second villager was killed. Ernest Tupper was born in Alkham on January 21st 1884. In 1914 he was a Petty Officer Stoker in the Royal Navy serving on HMS Aboukir. H.M.S. Aboukir was one of three ships torpedoed by U-boat 9 on Tuesday, September 22nd 1914. Ernest died during this attack. Prior to enlisting in the Royal Navy, Ernest was employed as a labourer by the South Eastern & Chatham Railway Company. OZ on ZWEIG - As the end-credits rolled up after Alkham Film Club's July showing of The Grand Budapest Hotel, I read that "the film was partly inspired by the works of Stefan Zweig." I've since discovered that the two Zweig works most responsible for Wes Anderson's script were (in English translation) Beware of Pity and The Post Office Girl. Zweig was born in Vienna on 28 November 1881into a wealthy middle-class and multilingual Jewish family. At Vienna University he studied philosophy and published his first collections of essays and poems. After gaining his doctorate, he moved into journalism, whilst still producing a stream of literary works throughout the 1900s. When World War I came in 1914, Zweig faced a dilemma; he was intensely patriotic, like many German and Austrian Jews at that time, yet rejected violence. He accepted work as an archivist at the Ministry of War, and remained a pacifist throughout his life. In 1920 Zweig married Friderike Maria von Winternitz and there followed two decades of prolific output when his work became popular worldwide except in the UK. In 1934 Hitler came to power, and Zweig took refuge in England. He and Friderike were divorced in 1938 and in the following year he married his secretary Lotte Altmann. In 1940, as German troops moved towards the Channel, the Zweigs moved again, to New York and then to the town of Petropolis in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Over the next two years, Zweig became overwhelmed by feelings of despair about humanity and its future. On 23 February 1942, the Zweigs died in a suicide pact. His farewell note described how in his life "...intellectual labour meant the purest joy and personal freedom the highest good on Earth." The Petropolis house is now a museum called Casa Stefan Zweig. (Steve Osborn)

FROM THE VICARAGE - Last month we marked the centenary of the outbreak of World War I. At St Anthony's, Alkham, there was a very moving Lights Out service on 4th August, followed by other events held in the village over the following weekend. Fortunately for us, most can now only imagine what it must have been like to sit in a trench, praying for shells to fall somewhere else - but an eventful trip to the Holy Land during July gave me some idea of how it must have been. A cheap taster for clergy considering becoming group leaders, we sailed on the Sea of Galilee, visited the places where Jesus lived and taught, the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, and more. Then we came to Jerusalem. On arrival we took our bags to our hotel rooms. As we admired the view of the ancient city wall from our third floor window, a siren began to wail. Quite possibly a rocket fired from Gaza was about to strike somewhere near us. We scanned the horizon - then realised that the window was not the place to be if anything did explode nearby. Nobody had told us what to do. We ran into the corridor – now what? What about going downstairs? Would we make it before the rocket landed? In the end we could only wait and, mercifully, nothing happened. So that's my experience of being under fire. It's absolutely nothing compared with what those in the trenches went through - or what others around our world are going through today. If you pray, please pray for them. Brian Williams

# **Farmers Market**

**START DATE 16<sup>th</sup> OCTOBER** in Alkham Village Hall and car park. **COMMEMORATION** – To remember the heroes of Alkham a cross is being mounted on the wall at the bottom of Slip Lane 100 years from the day that they died in WW1. The first is Charlie Grainger who died on 14<sup>th</sup> September and eventually there will be 16 crosses, which were made by Richard Tapsell.

FLOODING - KCC has received emergency funding from the Government to deal with problems arising from last winter's flooding. Some of this money has been allocated for Alkham to replace the two culverts that cross the dyke in front of Valley Cottages (The latter are houses on the Folkestone side of Alkham as you leave the village). The dyke will also be improved in that location and the adjacent valley road will be resurfaced. It is accepted that funding is limited but these works will increase the speed of the water in the dyke which culverts downstream will have difficulty in managing. KCC has said that if any funding is left at the end of the financial year then works to the culvert at the bottom of Short Lane will be treated as a priority. This of course leaves Hogbrook Lane by the village hall, where the culvert will have difficulty in managing the flow. The suggestion of a detaining pond to the west of Meggett Lane was rejected out of hand by the authorities as they consider that the land in that area is like a sponge and if a bund was constructed the water would just come out of the ground further along. Keeping to the simplistic analogy a better description maybe a bucket which fills up and overflows. The first bucket is at Standen/Drellingore and when it gets full it overflows. There are other buckets, one being on the village green, which also overflows. It's possible that if a dam was built round the bucket the water level would continue to rise. There are fissures in the chalk so some water may go sideways but, fairly obviously, it needs expert opinion rather than conjecture. editor

ALKHAM HEROES UPDATE - Research on the Alkham Heroes has focused on those whose names are on the village war memorial in an effort to ensure their memories are kept alive. A constant thought has been: 'How many men went to war from the village and did any survive?' Until last week that was unanswered but an email arrived with the following message: "Hi. My grandfather was Edward Gibbens. His regimental employment was from May 1915 to Feb 1919. He was a Brigade runner in the Queens Royal West Surreys and on his discharge papers it states that "He won and richly deserved the Military Medal on September 20th 1917 at Messines". When asked how or why he won his medal he always said "For saving the Officer's dog!" He and my grandma lived at Chalksole Green when I was a child and I believe his family were at Standen Terrace during WW1. I thought this might be of interest. I lived in Alkham from 1953 to 1973 when I married and love anything to do with Alkham's past. Hope he qualifies as an Alkham hero. Regards. Christine Carruthers nee Prescott". Edward was being very modest about his Military Medal. The Forces War Records website says: "The military decoration was awarded to E Gibbens for acts of gallantry and devotion to duty under fire or for individual or associated acts of bravery which were insufficient to merit the Distinguished Conduct Medal" though it does not give the specifics. The London Gazette reported the award on 30th October 1917. It is probable that, on the 20<sup>th</sup> September 1917, Edward was involved in the Third Battle of Ypres, better known as Passchendaele. Edward was indeed an Alkham Hero. OZ on SUPERMOON - Driving home across Romney Marsh one evening last month, we gradually became aware of the moon, smiling hugely and flooding the fields with light. It was the latest example of a 'supermoon', an astrological term describing the coincidence of a full or new moon with its closest approach to Earth, causing the moon to appear much larger than normal. To describe this phenomenon astronomers use the term 'perigee-syzygy', where 'perigee' is the point where the moon is closest to Earth, and 'syzygy' is the alignment of Earth, moon and sun in a straight line, which is when full and new moons occur. This explains the popularity of the word 'supermoon', used by astrologers since 1979. The moon that we saw over Romney Marsh on 8th September was also a 'Harvest Moon', defined as the full moon in the Northern Hemisphere that falls closest to the autumnal equinox on 22 September, and named after the extra time it gave to farmers to harvest their crops. The strange beauty of these moons has long been a popular theme in poetry, and my favourite is The Harvest Moon by Ted Hughes, which starts: "The flame-red moon, the harvest moon, / Rolls along the hills, gently bouncing, / A vast balloon, / Till it takes off, and sinks upward / To lie on the bottom of the sky, like a gold doubloon. / The harvest moon has come, / Booming softly through heaven, like a bassoon. /And the earth replies all night, like a deep drum." In later lines he describes how cows and sheep "stare up at her petrified, while she swells / Filling heaven" and then how "gold fields of stiff wheat / Cry 'We are ripe, reap us!' " It's a lovely poem. Check it out on the internet - you'll never regret it. (Steve Osborn)

**OZ on WHISTLING** – A friend mentioned one of his neighbours, who often whistles and always seems happy and healthy, and asked "Does whistling have health benefits and, if so, why don't people whistle so much now as they used to?" My partner and I spend a lot of time in our retirement helping people of all ages, particularly the elderly, take up music, especially singing, partly for the sheer pleasure of it, and also for the undoubted mental and physical benefits it brings. Research to demonstrate this has taken place worldwide, including locally at the Sidney de Haan Research Centre at Canterbury Christ Church University. It hadn't occurred to us until our friend's question that whistling might have similar properties, and so we were pleased to discover that whistling is indeed advocated world-wide by medical researchers. In addition to raising mood and reducing stress, the deep diaphragmatic breathing of whistling directly aids the heart and lungs, by exercising them and importing more oxygen, and indirectly benefits the other internal organs and circulation. In particular, the 'puckered lips position' necessary to whistle is similar to that used in 'purse-lipped breathing', a therapy prescribed sometimes in dealing with chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder (COPD). As for the second part of the question, it's true that whistling is not heard so much these days, and I suggest that the reason is the popularity of cheap portable digital devices, often permanently plugged into the ear. In former times, whistling was very much part of popular culture, ranging from the 'whistle while you work' phenomenon to music-hall entertainers such as Ronnie Ronalde. Today, workplaces are full of artificial noise from security alarms, PA systems, and the like, and much popular music is heavily electronic. Perhaps nowadays we all need a little whistling therapy. #### ALKHAM VALLEY HISTORICAL RESEARCH GROUP

During 2007-8 many readers may remember the Bronze Age (BA) and Anglo-Saxon (A/S) cemeteries discovered by the author near Wolverton on the ridge. Our initial thoughts from the A/S artefacts recovered from the double-tiered weapons burial are now in a case at Dover Museum for public and school educational use. These finds date to the 6th & 7th centuries and the cemetery was assigned to this date. However recent C14 (carbon dating), financed from donations mainly from the Alkham Valley residence, has allowed the (AVHRG) to have four samples tested. To our surprise, the results from other burials provided a date range from 353 AD to 424 AD towards the end of Roman rule in Britain. The extent of this cemetery would not be large enough for general use over a 400 year period and therefore may allude to a private place of interment by successive generations of the same landowner's family and perhaps farm labours. Along with the unique burials now in the case at Dover, the site has the potential to be the only private cemetery in use for a long period to be found in this region of Kent? Another first for Alkham. The former B/A burial barrow MII located on the ridge has been dated to 1800BC however, up until now we have no date for MI. A C14 sample from a destroyed grave on MI has since revealed a date of 1463BC. The AVHRG has now run out of funds to carry out further date tests and Isotope analysis. Isotope could tell us where these people lived when children whether in this area or the continent! Unfortunately, our funding relies mainly on local support and we appeal to you for assistance to continue this research. We need around £3,000. **VALLEY COTTAGES** – The replacement of the bridges in front of Valley Cottages to the west of the village is still going ahead. As some of the structures require a splayed entrance they are currently being designed, which accounts for the delay. Trees have been removed from the dyke in this area to improve the flow but it was noted that the shredded timber had been left in the dyke.

**PUMPING STATION** – There has been a slight delay to the new pumping station at Lower Standen due to unforeseen ground conditions and completion is expected by spring 2015.



DYKE - Following the walk-through with various

bodies associated with the flooding, KCC have agreed, as a one off, to clear the dyke. This will be from Hogbrook Lane, by the village hall, across the village green and down to Short Lane where they will also remove the blockage to the west.

**PHONE BOX** – The phone box in Ewell Minnis at the top of Wolverton Hill is not working and has also been vandalised with at least 7 panes being broken. The cost of maintaining this phone box is being met by Philip Young, who used to live at the Minnis, and the fault has been reported to BT.

**HEDGE AND BUSH TRIMMING** – A local resident has asked if something could go in the Newsletter about trimming hedges and bushes. Before carrying

out any work to trim, cut, coppice or lay a hedge, you must check for nesting birds. These are most likely to be found in the main nesting period which is from 1 March to 31 July, as a general guide. If nesting birds are present, you must not undertake any work which might harm the birds or destroy their nests as you could be prosecuted under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

In December 2004 I wrote about Bruce OZ on TRUCE – Bairnsfather, the Royal Warwickshire Regiment lieutenant and war cartoonist, who participated in the famous 'Christmas Truce', when on Christmas Eve 1914, British and German soldiers silenced their guns, collected their dead, and spent Christmas exchanging food, drink, tobacco and songs. Ten years on, it is the centenary of that truce and a good time to ponder on how it came about and what it meant. It was not the first unofficial truce ever, either at Christmas or any other time. Such events have been recorded for centuries, from the Anglo-French wars, the Napoleonic wars, the American Civil War and War of Independence, the Crimean War and the Boer War, in fact whenever combatants were forced into close proximity and got to know each other. That was certainly so in December 1914; some trenches were as little as 5 to 10 yards apart, enabling troops to hear the enemy talking. According to Tony Ashworth, in his book "Trench Warfare 1914-1918", this gave rise to the 'Live and let Live' principle, whereby soldiers, unless instructed, didn't open fire unless the enemy did so. Furthermore, neither side opened fire at important times, such as breakfast and dinner. With the two sides sharing a common culture and religion it was only a short step to a full-blown truce on Christmas Day 1914. Bairnsfather described how at St-Yvon the Germans decorated Christmas trees and sang carols, the British responded, and soon the combatants exchanged tobacco, spirits, sausages and chocolate, sang and hugged, and played football in no man's land. It all had to end; by New Year fighting had recommenced, ordered by the rival military authorities, who were noisily outraged, but quietly lenient, as their trenches had been strengthened and their troops reinvigorated during the truce.
