FRAUD IN ALKHAM – Yodel delivered an unexpected but correctly named and addressed parcel to a house in Alkham. Thinking it might be a present the parcel was accepted, but on opening it was found to contain items of some value. Shortly afterwards a woman phoned (number withheld) purportedly from the supplier, who said a package had been addressed incorrectly and someone would pick it up later that evening. The homeowner was suspicious and phoned the supplier directly and they confirmed the details were correct but on checking credit card and bank details found them to be different. It was established that the scammer had set up a bank account, e-mail contact and an account with the sender of equipment. The police were informed and a little later a man in a high vis jacket arrived at the door to pick up the parcel. He was told the sender had been contacted and the police informed with the result that the man then left at great speed.

TRAFFIC - On December 8th, 42 people attended a presentation by Cllr Geoff Hillier at the Village Hall to learn about progress on the traffic action plan for the Alkham Valley. The plan objectives are to reduce vehicle speed, road accidents and the number of vehicles using the valley as a through route to avoid the A20. Financial constraints will dictate the requirement for a phased implementation of the plan over several years with the Parish expected to provide KCC with about 30% of the total capital cost which is anticipated to be in the range of £100-£120k for initial stages and circa £240k overall. The proposals were well received by all those present. A questionnaire is contained within the Newsletter and all adult residents are requested to either complete it, and place it into the Parish Council Suggestion box outside the village hall, or preferably, visit www.alkham.org, where on the home page you will find, "Alkham Resident Traffic Calming Survey response click here", to complete the questionnaire on line. FROM THE VICARAGE - A while ago I was fortunate enough to visit the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem - the traditional site of the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is usually thronged with pilgrims and, as you can imagine, there is much to see. Among them are the tiny crosses that medieval pilgrims used to carve into the walls when they finally arrived at this holiest place of the Christian world. Why? We can only guess – perhaps in thanksgiving for having survived the journey without being shipwrecked, murdered or succumbing to the plague. I was in St Laurence Church, Hougham, a while ago when some visitors walked in and started to look around. Eventually one noticed something that I had never spotted before. On one of the pillars in the chancel are carved some crosses exactly like those in Jerusalem – difficult to see but there nonetheless, left centuries ago probably as a 'thank you' for a safe return from the Holy Land. People talk about being able to read churches. Everything in them - fine monuments, elaborate stained glass windows, tiny carved crosses, and everything else in between - tells the stories of those who were there before us. Now, at our own St Anthony's, work is about to begin to install the kind of facilities that we have come to expect. They will be there in the church together with the coffin lid of Herbert de

Averenches, the fine arcade in the North Aisle that the monks of St Radigund's left us and all the other things that tell the stories of the people who have lived here over the centuries - a testament to the vision, expertise, dedication, hard work and generosity of those of our own time. God bless you, every one.

IN MARCH 1772 there was an advert in the Kentish Express: *Oak* timber to be sold by auction on Monday the 13th day of April instant, at three o'clock in the afternoon, at the sign of the Fox and Goose, in Church Alkham Street. About one hundred and sixty trees, marked and landing upon a piece of wood land, called Stone Hill wood, in the parish of Alkham. For further particulars, enquire of Mr. Fabricant Attorney, Dover. Stone Hill wood is at the junction of Slip Lane and Chalksole Green Lane and The Fox and Goose, which was the pub, is now called Forstal Cottage. Perhaps the trees went to Chatham for a ship that fought Napoleon.

ALKHAM WHIST DRIVE – Prior to the 1950's, whist was played in the Long Room at The Marquis before moving to the Village Hall because gambling wasn't allowed on licensed premises. George Kitham, Maurice Tutt, Ted Goldfinch, Cecil Godden, Margaret Archer and the Polden family ran the whist over the years and then Mabel Tapsell, Chris's first wife, took over in the 1980's until her death in 1991. Chris Tapsell continued to run the drives until December 2017 and in addition to renting the hall, money was given for the hall improvement and over the years a substantial amount was raised. Chris has attempted to find some alternative, either playing in the afternoon or a volunteer willing to continue with the Friday evenings but to no avail. If after reading this, you feel that you could assist, the opportunity remains - those loyal whist players, none of whom are from the village, are still willing and even keen to support the popular evening. FROM THE VICARAGE - I have never been able to keep a diary, and admire the self-discipline of those who do. Maybe that's why, when I first came across it years ago, I enjoyed reading a book entitled Transport of Delight by Methodist minister and now-retired Norwich bus driver Jack Burton. Over a year, he wrote about his dayto-day existence – not just about church and his wife and family, but also his love of football, evenings in the pub, and life seen from behind the wheel of a bus. One entry describes how, while on a meal break during their shift just before Christmas, he persuaded his conductor to join him in visiting Norwich Cathedral. This was not something his conductor would normally have done, and walking through the door, he gazed around. In front of them was a huge crib, ready for the Christmas services. He looked at it, turned to his driver and asked: Is this for everyone? Sadly, some people seem to think that churches only welcome a certain kind of person. Not true -Jesus seems to have been ready to mix with just about anyone, and I'm sure that if asked, Jesus would say that he wants his followers to do as he did. I once invited someone whose wife had recently died to a church coffee morning, hoping that he might try making new

friends. But I'm not religious! he said. But you can drink coffee and talk to people – so you're in! I replied. When we can, we keep our churches open so that people can just go in and pray, be quiet, look around or whatever. You don't have to be a churchgoer or a certain type of person to be welcome. He is asking for observations, views and information about the byways and their future management. He wants the consultation to be as inclusive as possible and for the letter to be circulated to others who wish to contribute to the process. The consultation is the next step in a process that may lead to Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) excluding 4x4s and motor bikes from these byways. There is no certainty at all that this will happen - the byways may be left open to all vehicles and they may be closed to all users on the grounds of safety as happened in 2016-7. To get TROs excluding motor vehicles we need to make the case to KCC. The Alkham & District byways group has provided safety assessments, photos and much else to KCC about the damage to byways and surrounding land caused by vehicles. Residents and users of the byways also need to give their views to KCC in this consultation. I have sent copies of the consultation letter to people who I know have an interest. 

LIME KILN – About 400 metres up Slip Lane there is a right turn to Lydden, known locally as White Hill or Chalky Hill. The road is very steep and at the top of the first rise there used to be a lime kiln by the side of the road (not photo). The location is easy to spot as there is a large hole where the chalk was excavated to make lime. If chalk (CaCo3) is heated to 900°C it changes to lime (CaCo1) and carbon dioxide

(Co2) with the resultant lime being primarily used to make mortar. The kiln would have been funnel shape with alternate layers of chalk and coal in it and after three days of burning, lime was produced. Many thanks to Alan Latham for finding the 19th century map. editor

THE WOLVERTON WARRIOR - A few weeks ago I visited two of Alkham's oldest residents who have recently moved to Dover. They are two Anglo-Saxon males excavated in 2007 and 2008 by a team led by Vince Burrows that included students and Alkham residents. The excavations identified two Bronze age barrows (burial mounds) and an early Anglo-Saxon cemetery on the barrows. Anglo-Saxons in Kent often chose to bury their dead on much earlier burial sites perhaps as a way of associating themselves with their ancestors. The small cemetery included a remarkable double grave containing the Wolverton warrior with his sword, spear, knife, shield boss (the metal cone at the centre of a wooden shield) and a pottery wine vessel. Remarkably a second male burial was directly underneath the first burial separated by wood planking. The double grave and its contents are now in a display case at the museum. Alkham residents contributed to the cost of the case. I recommend visiting the museum to see the impressive display cabinet with a reconstruction of the grave and the finds accompanied by a story board. Entry to the museum is free. More information and interim reports can be found at http://www.alkhamarchaeology.co.uk. Vince plans to publish the full excavation report in Archaeologia Cantiana, the journal of Kent Archaeological Society. Peter Smith

PIMLICO BYWAYS - There is some misinformation being expressed that the Pimlico byways should be restored to bridleways as they had been for centuries. The Pimlico byways have never been bridleways. In 1949 when the PROWs were first recorded ER185, for example, was listed as a 'Cart Road Footpath' which it clearly was as it served the Pimlico hamlet. This didn't really clarify who was allowed to use it. The 1968 Countryside Act attempted to address this requesting that Highway Authorities research what actual rights did exist and reclassify all PROWs as either a footpath, bridleway or byway (BOAT). At this stage ER185, ER25 and ER122 were shown as byways on the draft map. After public consultation and due process they were all recorded as byways and byways they remain. There may be some confusion caused when ER185 was erroneously finger posted as a bridleway. ER185 was part of a KCC promoted 'Alkham Valley Rides' which was created by KCC officers who were no part of the PROW team. They appear to have signed paths at will with no reference to their actual status. Locally these erroneous status indicators have been removed and the correct status restored. OZ on APRIL FOOL'S DAY - Over the years, I've often mentioned April Fool's Day in passing, but never as a topic because its origins are so obscure. The most popular theory concerns European calendar reform. In 46BC, Julius Caesar introduced his Julian calendar that made 1 January the first day of the year. Over the next 1500 years, some European countries moved their first day to 1 April for theological reasons. One such was France, but in 1564 the French King Charles IX moved his first day back to 1 January for secular reasons. In 1582, Pope Gregory also moved the date back to 1 January for all Christian Europe (except Britain). The story then goes that, in continental Europe, those who continued celebrating New Year on 1 April were teased as "April Fools." The only flaw in all this is that there are continental references to "April Fools" from before 1564, and British references from hundreds of years before 1752, the year that Britain adopted the Gregorian calendar. The earliest British reference is probably the Nun's Priest's Tale in Chaucer's Canterbury Tales (1392), describing the tricks played by a fox in catching the cock Chauntecler, but the wording is so ambiguous that the date could be either 1 April or 3 May. Throughout the 16th century there were several references in France to 'poisson d'Avril', meaning 'April fish' (still used today.) In 1686 the English antiquarian John Evelyn wrote 'Fooles Holy Day. We observe it on ye first of April.' This was the first clear reference to the tradition in Britain. Finally, on 2 April 1698, a British newspaper reported that 'Yesterday being the first of April, several persons were sent to the Tower Ditch to see the Lions washed.' April Fool's Day was at last a fixture. (Steve Osborn)

ALBERT FRANCIS, the son of James (a Poultry Keeper) and Rose Francis was born about 1898 in Yew Cottage, South Alkham. The 1911 Census reveals he was a 12-year-old school boy. Albert was a Private in the 2nd Battalion, Essex Regiment and died on Thursday, 18th April 1918. At this time his parents were living in Folkestone. Albert was aged 20 when he died, and he is buried at Chocques Military Cemetery, Pas de Calais.

CECIL G ALLEN was the son of Mrs E Allen of Chalksole Green. The 1911 Census reveals that he was a 13-year-old schoolboy. Cecil enlisted at Woolwich and was in 'C' Company, 11th Battalion, Border Regiment when he died on Tuesday, 30th April 1918. The regiment had been in the Front Line until the 25th April but between the 25th and 30th was 'out of the line' and taking part in military training, church parades and a football tournament. It is recorded that Cecil "died of wounds" which presumably he received whilst at the Front. Cecil was aged 20 when he died. Cecil is buried at Bagneux British Cemetery, Gezaincourt.

FROM THE VICARAGE - Many of you will remember the late, great actor and comedian Peter Sellers – perhaps as the accident-prone French detective Inspector Clouseau in the Pink Panther series of films, or in some of the other roles that he played. Sitting with a cup of tea in front of the TV and flicking through the channels recently, I came across one of his earlier films - Heavens Above! In it, he plays a vicar. As you can imagine, I was instantly hooked, and ended up spending much longer over my cup of tea than I had meant to. In the film Sellers' character is appointed to a well-to-do parish – completely by mistake. Practising what he preaches, he scandalises his parishioners by taking in various waifs and strays, appointing a dustman as churchwarden, and persuading a local landowner to provide free food for the townspeople. Nobody ever expected him to take Christianity that seriously, and in the resulting chaos it becomes clear that he really will have to go – but how? PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - Just a reminder that Alkham has a new website up and running; we would like as many people to subscribe to it as possible. The Community Led Plan (CLP) group met again in April to discuss moving forward with the launch day. UNOFFICIAL BUS STOPS - When you wish to get off a bus, bus companies advise you to ring the bell, remain seated and wait for the bus to stop. This is all well and good for official bus stops, but it doesn't work for unofficial bus stops. In rural areas bus drivers are instructed to stop on request if safe to do so. When KCC ran the 91-bus service with their own buses and driver's local knowledge enabled the driver to know where to stop when requested at an unofficial bus stop. When Stagecoach took over the route that local knowledge was lost especially with their all drivers drive all routes policy. This problem was raised by a parishioner at a Parish Council meeting. So, what to do? I contacted Stagecoach for advice. Sorry to say the advice given wasn't very helpful. "When boarding the bus advise the driver where you want to get off. Due to the low volume of passengers on the 91 route it shouldn't be difficult for the driver to remember your request". In theory fine, in reality nonsense. For example, three unofficial stops: Drellingore Rise, Meggett Lane and Valley Cottages. Most drivers will not know these locations (local knowledge lost) and will not know where to stop unless you ring the bell, walk to the front of the bus and make your request in person. I will try the official advice next time I catch the bus and see what happens. Anthony Barrier

STATIONARY ENGINES - Richard Miller, who lives in Newlyns Meadow, started collecting stationary engines about 4 years ago. His first engine was a 1946 Lister D which he bought as a non-runner, but after many hours fully restored it to a 'like new' smooth running condition. He also rebuilt a 1945 Wolseley WD8 engine from a non-runner to show standard; the WD refers to the War Department and they were built to run smoothly and as quietly possibly behind enemy

lines. He has also restored an Amanco Hit 'n' Miss engine, which only has one mechanically operated valve (the exhaust valve), hence its name 'Hit 'n' Miss' and a Lister Junior twin flywheel engine built in 1945. So, the next time you go to a Steam Rally or Vintage Fayre have a look at these engines as each one will have had many hours spent on restoration to preserve them as running pieces of industrial history. ALKHAM HEROES - George Collard, who the 1911 Census reveals, was single, aged 18 and a "General Labourer", died 51 weeks after his brother, Edward. George had emigrated to Australia in 1912 (the year his mother died) when he was 20 years old. He lived at Coonabarabran, Warrumbugle Shire, New South Wales, where he worked as an agricultural labourer. It was here that he enlisted on 3rd July 1916. Following basic training George sailed from Sydney on 17th October 1916 on the requisitioned P&O steamship H.M.A.T. Borda as a Gunner in the 34th Battalion, Australian Infantry. George "died of wounds received in action in France" on Monday, May 6th 1918, about 100 miles from his Alkham home. He was aged 25 and is buried in St. Sever Cemetery Extension, Rouen. Mark Robson

OZ on CREATION – In the spring, we went to Maidenhead to hear Maidenhead Choral Society, which includes my daughter in the soprano line, sing Haydn's oratorio The Creation. It was a superb performance from choir, soloists and orchestra; I've sung this same work many times over the years, but never to this high standard. From where we sat in the front row, I could see and hear every musician; halfway through the second half I began to think of the complexity of what was going on in their heads and nervous systems, and how and why it all came about. I grew up in a devout religious environment, and learned that God created humans between 6,000 and 10,000 years ago on the sixth day of a week in which he had created the remainder of Life, the Universe and Everything. Animals and the first two humans emerged fully formed and there was no mention of who

For me, both theories were

perfectly plausible, and I remain happy with my teacher's explanation that the first story was "just a parable for what actually happened, as that was so complicated." The bigger puzzle is why is there a universe at all? What if there were no universe? I'm quite capable of brooding

on this subject until my head spins and I wonder if indeed I exist or not. At that point the only remedy is to listen to some music, Haydn perhaps or even my old idol Count Basie. Steve Osborn



ADDERS have been sighted in the dog walking area in Alkham and they can be told apart from grass snakes and slow worms by their distinctive zig-zag markings. Snake bites can be fatal, so dog owners need to act quickly if a dog has

been bitten. The dog will almost certainly cry out as bites are very painful. There is usually severe swelling around the bite area and if around the face or throat can be very dangerous. If your dog has been bitten, try and keep the dog as calm and still as possible and it is better to bring transport to the dog rather than making them walk back. Go straight to your vet and do not interfere with the wound or tie any sort of tourniquet because there is a danger of tissue damage around the bite.

From the vicarage - Norwich was once the home of the first woman to write a book in English - Julian of Norwich. She lived towards the end of the fourteenth century and lived as an anchoress a woman who lived in a cell alongside a church, dedicated to a life of prayer and to doling out advice to those who came to her window asking for it. Today visitors can see St Julian's Church, heavily rebuilt after being bombed in 1942, and Mother Julian's cell - just as I did recently. Mother Julian was convinced that with God, our failings whatever and however serious they might be - never have the last word. "All Shall Be Well," she famously wrote - a comforting thought in our anxious times, ideal for printing on a mug. Yes, I do have one. I had travelled to Norwich by train. Everything had gone smoothly until about half an hour away from journey's end when we slowed to a crawl. The PA system crackled. The conductor explained that we were approaching a series of level crossings. There had been reports of something on the line, and they had been told to slow and keep a sharp lookout. In mid-sentence, he suddenly interrupted himself: LOOK AT THAT VOLVO! Of course, everyone did just that. With the barrier down and nothing in sight, the Volvo driver had impatiently positioned himself ready to zig-zag over the line until alerted to the approach of our train. He sat sheepishly at the wheel as one coachload of passengers after another rumbled past, eyeballing him as they went,

accompanied by a furious lecture from the conductor over the PA system about rules at level crossings. "All Shall Be Well," wrote Mother Julian. But whatever our shortcomings are, it probably helps if we work on them...



ALKHAM HEROES TRIP - On Tuesday, September 11th, Den Barnard and I are taking a coach to France to visit various sites linked to the First World War. Our first stop will be at Vimy Ridge. This was the scene of particularly fierce fighting which involved some of the Alkham men though is now known as the scene of a famous Canadian victory. The land on which the memorial stands was donated by the French to the Canadians and is a moving memorial to the men who died here. You are able to see and walk through the trench system and gain an insight into the strategic importance of the Ridge. We are hoping that we will also be able to have a guided tour of the tunnels in which troops sheltered and gathered before battle. This can only be booked on the day so will depend on demand at the time. There is plenty to see and absorb on the site if a tour of the tunnels is not possible. This will be our lunch stop too. The afternoon will be a time for reflection on the direct impact of war. We will visit the French National Military Cemetery at Ablain St-Nazaire which also houses a memorial to those killed in the region and where several Alkham men are named. We will then travel the short distance to Neuville St-Vaast to visit a German War Cemetery. Den and I have carried out a recce of the trip and feel this is a fitting way to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War. If you would like to join us the details are: Cost: £30 (inc a Ploughman's lunch); Depart Alkham: 07.20 return: 19.00 (approx.). Payment will be required on booking and, if you have to drop out it will be up to you to find replacement and cover your costs (we've been caught out on this before!). OZ on STONE – It's 75 years since summer 1943, when Allied forces were busy planning D-Day, the attempt to land in Normandy. One of the problems was delivery of petrol to the forces after landing, as tankers and ship-to-shore pipelines would be susceptible to attack. In 1942 an undersea pipeline was proposed by Admiral Mountbatten, and agreed between him, Geoffrey Lloyd (Secretary for Petroleum), and Arthur Hartley (Chief Engineer of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company). The strategy was code-named Operation Pluto (Pipe-Lines Under The Ocean). Later that year the government instructed Siemens Brothers of Woolwich to design a suitable pipeline. Initial designs showed numerous problems when stress-tested, particularly with joints. And it was here that three more of the war's unsung heroes emerged, when Siemens employed a specialist lead business, W P Stone of Brockley, to devise a technique for jointing the 700-yard lengths of lead alloy pipes. After successful trials in the Thames, Stone was awarded the contract, and the three Stone brothers, Frank, Albert, and Ron began making the joints at Woolwich and Callenders Cables of Erith. They worked 18 hours a day and 7 days a week producing the joints for 492 miles of pipeline from Dungeness to Boulogne and Shanklin to Cherbourg. Of necessity the work was done in such secrecy that the Stone family had no idea what the brothers were up to. In October 1944 the Boulogne pipelines delivered 3,000 tons of fuel a day, rising to 4,500 tons by the end of the war. By 1949, over 90% of the pipeline was salvaged, the value of which far exceeded the recovery costs. After the war Frank extended the family business into lead shielding for the expanding nuclear and medical industries, working as a consultant until the age of 83. He died aged 90 in 2004. From the vicarage - By the time you read this, the Royal Wedding will be a dim and distant memory, from way back before the World Cup took over our TV screens. But think for a moment – which memory of that day most sticks in your mind? For me, it was the number of people who remarked on that sermon. Actually, it wasn't Bishop Michael Curry's fourteen minutes of fame, as some of the newspapers seemed to suggest he is, after all, in the USA what the Archbishop of Canterbury is in the UK – but his thoughtful, carefully prepared and energetically delivered sermon (I did read it) certainly got him noticed on this side of the Atlantic. Sermons are strange things. I sometimes turn up on a Sunday with what I expect to be an absolute winner, and nobody says a word about it afterwards. But there have also been times when I've struggled to come up with anything that I felt was worth saying to be told afterwards, "Great sermon – thank you!" I remember being recognised by a receptionist at the opticians once. She told me that she had heard me preach a couple of years previously on one of her occasional visits to church, and then completely surprised me by reminding me of exactly what I had said. Why did Bishop Curry hit bullseye? I think people were expecting ten minutes of boredom. Instead, they had fourteen minutes of anything but. They listened, and whatever they thought of what they heard, many were still

talking about it days afterwards. That's success. The much loved and sadly missed Rabbi Lionel Blue used to say that God shows his hand in the unlikeliest of places, airport lounges and parties included. Add weddings to that list! **Brian Williams**



OZ on PROMS (2018) – It's a busy time of year, both in the country, as harvest nears, and in the city, buzzing with tourists. Perhaps the only people who escape this seasonal pressure are children and the retired. Charles Lamb, in The Superannuated Man (1825), wrote "I have lost all distinction of season." For many, the summer season is marked by eating alfresco, drinking wine, and enjoying the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts, either live or on BBC radio and television. The Proms were founded in 1895 by Robert Newman, manager of the Queen's Hall, who appointed a young singing teacher called Henry Wood to conduct the concerts. Wood composed the Fantasia on British Sea-Songs, incorporating James Thomson's Rule Brittania, for the Proms concert celebrating the 100th anniversary of Trafalgar in 1905. Elgar's Land of Hope and Glory was sung to end the first night in 1914, and was triumphantly repeated on the last night in 1918. Early in the next war, in 1941, the Queen's Hall was gutted in an airraid, and the Proms moved to the Royal Albert Hall, where they have since remained. Each Proms season has several themes, and one of this year's, marking the end of World War 1, is the way that British composers responded to that war and its aftermath. Hence there is music by Hubert Parry, Vaughan Williams, Holst, John Ireland and Frank Bridge. I'll know when the season changes again, from summer to autumn, when committee agendas fall through the letterbox, and the Last Night of the Proms is over. As Barrie Hall says, "Sunday morning after the Last Night feels strange and hollow, like the sad ending of a lovely long holiday" and he looks forward to the next season "when like summer's flowers the glorious Proms will once more burst into bloom, all over again." FROM THE VICARAGE - As we all know, certain things happen at the same time each year, almost without exception. Easter is over and done with for this year, but once summer is over Harvest Festival, Remembrance Day and the run up to Christmas seem to follow in quick succession. But before all that, there's August, when the annual ceremony of the Trimming of the Hedge takes place at the vicarage. May I say how much I appreciate the kindness of all those passers-by who are kind enough to smile, wave or pass the time of day during the ceremony when they see Yours Truly balancing on top of a stepladder. But August is about more than just trimming hedges. The church at Hougham is dedicated to St Laurence, whose feast day is on 10th August. He lived in Roman times at a time when the Church was being persecuted. Ordered to hand over its treasures, he produced a group of poor people – these were its treasures, he said. At Capel, the church is dedicated to St Radigund, a princess who turned her back on a life at court to set up an abbey and to look after the poor and sick. Her feast is on 13th August. Alkham is dedicated to St Anthony of Pamiers, or Antoninus as he is sometimes called. A convert to Christianity, he is said to have returned home as a missionary after being ordained priest in Rome, and to have been martyred. He is remembered on 2nd September. The Prayer Book

describes saints as 'lights of the world in their several generations' - people whose devotion has been inspiration to others to bring light to the world's dark places. Now you know what I'm thinking about when I'm trimming that hedge.

ALKHAM BYWAYS, latest position - In June Pimlico and Bullrun byways were re-opened to vehicles following a six-month closure by Kent County Council to prevent further vehicle damage over the winter. This followed KCC's preliminary consultation on their future management. Possible management outcomes include permanent Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) excluding all motor vehicles throughout the year - something which local residents having been calling for. Following the consultation KCC were due to present their recommendations to its consultative group called the Byway Management Working Group in June. Unfortunately, this was not done, and we are still waiting for the recommendations. At present the byway surfaces are in good condition in most places because of the last closures and exceptionally dry weather. KCC have funds available for some work on parts of the byways in poor condition. The byways group will continue to press for permanent TROs. Please contact me if you would like further information. EVERDEN BYWAY – At South Alkham, Pimlico Way rises to the high ground where the byway splits with one arm leading to Everden. Martin Scherer, who owns the land, has been carrying out a lot of work adjacent to Pimlico Way and the Everden Byway including clearing the scrub land which has pleased many people including Kent Wildlife Trust and Natural England who want to see sheep grazing. The crater field is too steep and undulating for vine trellising so agro-forestry and grazing between widely spaced nut trees is planned. Having cleared the vegetation alongside the Everden byway it was realised that parts were precipitously close to the craters, so the byway is being widened to increase safety and the banks used by 4 x 4's removed. In the process it was discovered that part of the Everden Byway is in the wrong place, which KCC will reinstate. Martin intends to start grazing sheep and another field will be filled with vines next year. Pimlico is beautiful and should be shared so a track along the bottom boundary of the Crater Field will be created for a beautiful walk beneath trees, which friends of the Vineyard can walk or ride horses; friends are free to walk anywhere there are not grazing animals. To be a vineyard friend, people need to click 'like' to Pimlico Vineyard's FaceBook page.

MITCH on PROVENÇAL SONG – If you had a halfway decent voice and a love of music and a smattering of one or two European languages you might just be invited on the Summer Tour to the south of France - along with twenty young musicians. Most people who survive will have needed a shock from a defibrillator to correct a chaotic heart rhythm. The photo shows a publicaccess defibrillator with a key pad for which the 999 operator should give the code. They are expensive and there is a slight delay but a number of people in Alkham have been asking for one.



ALKHAM HEROES - October marks the centenary of the last of the Alkham Heroes of the First World War.

JOSEPH EDWARD MOUNT was born about 1896 in Guston. In 1911 the Census reveals he was a 15-year-old, 'Farm Yard Boy'. Joseph enlisted as Driver T1/1765 in the Army Service Corps and first saw active service in France on the 26th October 1914. Later in the War, as a result of gas poisoning, he was discharged as medically unfit for further active service. Medals awarded: Victory Medal, British War Medal, 1914 Star, & Silver War Badge. By 1918 he was employed as a War Goods Inspector (Army Pensioner) and worked in Salford near Manchester. He married Edith Bailey (George Bailey's sister), on the 26th September 1918 at St Anthony, Alkham. Only two weeks after their marriage, on Friday, 11th October 1918, Joseph died, at 58 Great Cheetham Street, West Broughton, Salford (Lancs) - aged 23. The cause of death was recorded as Enteric Fever [Typhoid] but this was also the time of the second wave of the so-called Spanish Flu, an epidemic which killed more people than the First World War and which was often mistakenly reported as Typhoid. Joseph's new bride, Edith, was with him at his death. His body was brought back to be buried on 15th October 1918 at St. Anthony, Alkham. Mark Robson OZ on FOYLES - In the 1950s, a day in London was a wondrous thing.

We would arrive by the slow train from East Kent, and head straight for the Trafalgar Square soup kitchen that sold soup and bread for one shilling, accompanied by a jukebox playing classical music at sixpence a go. This was often followed by a trip to Foyles, the eccentric bookshop in Charing Cross Road, either to sell used books, buy new ones or simply browse. I was surprised and a little concerned recently when news arrived of the sale of the famous Foyles chain to Waterstones. Foyles began in 1903 when the brothers William and Gilbert Foyle failed their Civil Service exams, successfully sold their textbooks, and began selling books from home. In 1904 they set up a shop in Peckham, followed by the Charing Cross Road shop in 1906. In 1930, William's daughter Christina started the literary lunches at the shop that continue today; over the years over 1,000 authors and 500,000 guests have attended, including international leaders and most British Prime Ministers. Christina took over the business in 1945, and there followed a difficult period, due partly to postwar lack of investment and partly to the legendary eccentricity of Foyles management. For instance, Christine rejected all artificial aids such as electronic tills or calculators, and would not accept orders by telephone. Customers queued three times: to collect an invoice, to pay the invoice, then to collect the book, as sales staff were not allowed to handle cash. In 1999 Christina died and control passed to her nephew Christopher, who modernized Foyles business practices and expanded the number of shops. Waterstones now promises to keep the Foyles name and standalone status intact, so as to help fight Amazon, which is comforting news for booklovers. (Steve Osborn)

FROM THE VICARAGE - If you drive, you probably know what it's like to turn into a busy supermarket car park, carefully follow the arrows to a suitable parking space, and have to swerve to avoid someone who has apparently noticed neither the arrows nor the 'no entry' signs telling them that they are going the wrong way. In such a situation you and I would naturally smile, apologise and politely allow others to go safely on their way. But I was shown an online video recently that showed someone who, having made such a mistake, reacted rather differently. Someone chose to film what followed on their smartphone and posted it on the internet for the entire world to see. I once visited a house where a plaque hung in the hall. It read: "Christ is the head of the home, the unseen guest of every meal, the silent listener to every conversation." I must admit that at the time this idea felt a bit creepy – but like everyone else, I've grown used to being in shops, in streets and on trains where cameras watch my every move, so the idea of Christ watching me as well doesn't really bother me. The writer of Psalm 25 pleads with God: do not remember the sins of my youth or my transgressions. Online videos offer a 'watch again' option at the end – fine if it's Gone with the Wind, your favourite band or

Rooney scoring for England, but not if the world's watching you having a difficult moment on a bad day over and over again. But the Psalmist would probably say that God isn't interested in watching our mistakes over and over again, only in our new beginnings — and that's where He scores over YouTube. Brian Williams

Den Barnard WILDLIFE IN THE GARDEN - Our garden is generally wildlife friendly and a bit too friendly on occasions; squirrels and a young rat have used the bird feeder more recently. We don't use the green refuse collection service and consequently have piles of decaying greenery and brownery (compost heaps?) in all corners of the garden. We also have 5 plastic compost bins. Opening these can make one jump especially when there are a couple of serpents in there. We knew we had a grass snake as we had seen it by the nature pond that is about two inches deep but attracts mating frogs and their predators every year. In the middle of June we found our snake in the plastic compost bin at the other end of the garden, shortly after, it was still in there when we saw another sliding away from the base of the bin leaving its skin behind it. Research revealed that they can produce up to 50 eggs but are unlikely to deposit them in plastic compost bins and so I did not look for them. Yesterday, in the middle of September, I saw the results of their visit. I thought it was a small slow worm but completely the wrong colour; it was on the paving just outside my garage but quickly slipped away under the door cill. The markings with intermittent dark patches down each side and the yellow collar are those of a young grass snake. I wonder where the other 49 are and how many will make it through the winter? Interested in the subject then visit https://kentarg.org or if you see a grass snake tell them. Alan Latham

FROM THE VICARAGE - I once heard of a young curate (no, not me) who stood up in church to preach his first ever Remembrance Sunday sermon. He had just begun by asking the congregation to imagine what the Somme must have been like, with its trenches, mud, and shells exploding everywhere when an elderly gentleman rose to his feet. "YOUNG PUPPY! I WAS THERE!" he barked, before storming out. Growing up, I sometimes heard my father and my uncles talking about their experiences in World War 2. Dad was an ammunition storeman in the Ordnance Corps; one uncle served aboard a minesweeper, another was an officer's batman. But one, who had seen action in Italy, spoke little about what he had done. I remember he mentioned Anzio, and also Monte Cassino. To a small boy, his stories sounded exciting. Only later did I realise the truth: that while still just a teenager he had seen - and done - things that nobody should have to see or do at any age. Returning home, at first he had talked endlessly about one particularly traumatic incident; only his uncle, himself a veteran of the Great War, seemed to understand what he had been through. This month sees the centenary of the end of World War 1. We are urged to remember. The services that will be held will include not only prayers for those who lost their lives in the world wars and in other conflicts since, but

also for peace now and in the future. Thankfully, like that young curate most of us can only imagine trenches, mud, shells and what my uncle and great uncle went through; most of us have been spared the reality. Let's pray that those who come after us may be as fortunate. **Brian Williams**

Meet the new team at The Marquis at the Christmas lights switch-on Join the new management team at The Marquis for mulled wine and mince pies as part of the village Christmas Lights switch-on event on December 8th, and find out more about what they have planned for your local pub. The 200-year-old inn was bought by Ashford's GSE Group earlier this year and is being run by the team behind the iconic Hythe Imperial hotel, which has recently undergone a four-year, multi-million-pound refurbishment. One of the first decisions of the new management team has been to restore the pub's original full name, so it will once again be known as the Marguis of Granby, while an application has been submitted to Dover District Council for permission to make cosmetic improvements to the exterior of the building, along with some internal changes. The pub will close from January 1st for refurbishment, and when it reopens Friday, March 29th under the new name, the aim is for it to become an important part of village life, a great place for you to eat and drink and meet up with your friends and neighbours, and a supporter of local projects and community events. The architect behind the refurbishment is John Rogers, the creator and owner of the Ramblinns group that includes the Five Bells at Brabourne, The Globe Inn at Rye, The Woolpack at Warehorne and the Radnor Arms at Folkestone. The new menu will see a move back to good quality, locally sourced food at realistic prices, accompanied by a selection of real ales and Kentish wines. The bar will be dog friendly and have open fires, while the hotel rooms will be refurbished to reflect the new country pub feel, with a number of beautiful new suites being created.

LEAD THEFT – An attempt was made to remove some lead panels from the roof of St. Anthony's church. A ladder must have been used, so if anyone saw suspicious activity or has local CCTV please contact the police quoting crime report number WTGTV7HGJJ.

ANNIE THURGARLAND the Watercourse Officer at the Kent Stour Countryside Partnership, gave a presentation to the Parish Council on the 5th November. Despite not being able to project her slides Annie proceeded to explain her role, acting with KCC, to identify possible solutions to mitigate against flooding in Alkham. Her focus is on using natural flood management measures to slow down flood water before it becomes a problem. There are many different techniques to do this using natural materials to create detaining ponds, but they are still on a learning curve to select the right solution to each problem area. Her suggestions for the creation of a holding pond on part of the Village Green, for example, was met with some objections but the PC undertook to consider her approach to flood control and reconvene a meeting in the near future to discuss specific areas where such natural flood management techniques might be applied. TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP (TAG) REPORT - The Parish Council, at their meeting on the 5th November, agreed to the setting up of a 'Traffic Implementation Group' (TIG) consisting of Councillors Geoff Hillier, Martin Hibbert and David Beaney, to carry forward the agreed traffic calming strategy for the Alkham Valley Road. The traffic calming measures, developed by TAG and having the overwhelming support of the people of Alkham are outlined in TAG's final report, a copy of which can be read on the Alkham Parish Council website www.alkhamparishcouncil.org.uk.

ALKHAM BOOK - The book 'A Brief History -Alkham Parish' has been updated and reprinted with four new pages which are: Coal exploration at Ellinge and other farms at Everden; Glebelands, the brickwork company and the lime kiln; North Hill and

The problem is probably caused by the increased use of the smaller type of camper van that do not necessarily have onboard chemical toilet facilities. A sign has been put up saying that the car park should not be used by overnight campers and the web site that advertises the location has been asked to remove it.

WAR MEMORIAL – The photo above shows the newly erected war memorial on the piece of land donated to the church by Malmain's farm in the late 19th century. The existing cemetery extended to most of the gravestones seen in the photo and new land was consecrated by the Bishop of Dover in October 1902. On Saturday 4th October 1919 the memorial, which was erected for the sixteen men of Alkham who were killed in the First World War, was unveiled by Mr. Harman who was the schoolmaster at Alkham. It cost £88 (£4300 in today's money) and was paid for by donations from residents of Alkham. The Marquis can be seen on the right of the photo and the land to the left, in front of cemetery, was later sold and bungalows were built there in the 1960's. Brian Wimsett

OZ on THE WIPERS TIMES – On 7 October 1914 some 8,000 German cavalrymen swept through Ypres, western Belgium, in one day, to refuel and stock up on their way to the coast. When British troops arrived on 14 October 1914, their first problem was how to pronounce the name of the town, and they guickly decided on 'Wipers'. Their second task, in conjunction with the French forces, was to stop the enemy from either reaching the coast or returning to Ypres. The subsequent battle ended inconclusively on 22 November. It was just the first in the series of five battles for Ypres, the last ending in October 1918, that came to define the nature of modern industrial warfare. In winter 1916 Captain Fred Roberts and Lieutenant Jack Pearson, of the 12th Battalion, Sherwood Foresters, discovered a damaged printing press in the ruins of the shelled Ypres. One of their sergeants, a peacetime printer, repaired the press, and the three of them used it to print the first edition, in February 1916, of The Wipers Times, a satirical newspaper in the tradition of school magazines and Punch. It was a morale booster, combining wickedly humorous reflections on trench life with poems, lampoons and in-jokes; one classic Lonely Hearts advertisement, commenting on the USA's absence from the war at that time, was headlined "Lonely President wishes to correspond with anyone." As the action moved around, the title changed, to The Kemmel Times, The Somme Times, and then to The BEF Times for security reasons. Other than this, the newspaper had "little trouble with the censors" according to Captain Roberts. In December 1918, the final edition, titled The Better Times, was published, with the sub-title "Xmas, Peace and Final Number." It's food for thought during the coming 100th anniversary Christmas season. Steve Osborn

FROM THE VICARAGE - Grumpy Vicar Moment: NONE of the Advent calendars that I saw in the seasonal aisle of a local supermarket had anything to do with the Christmas story! Grrr! Now, I can guess what you are probably thinking: "What an old meanie! We've been looking forward to our daily dose of chocolate throughout the first twenty-four days of December all year!" Or perhaps you prefer beer, or maybe perfume - you can buy Advent calendars with those in, too. But the ones I remember were magically Christmassy, with a picture behind each door until you reached the Nativity scene behind number 24. Then there was the Blue Peter Advent Crown! Remember that? How many families anticipated Christmas by collecting wire coat hangers, wire, baubles and tinsel ready for the moment when Valerie Singleton appeared on our TV screens and showed us one she had made earlier? She didn't just use real candles, she lit them, too! The instructions on the BBC website now recommend the tamer option of more baubles instead. For me a similar tradition that we have in church - the Advent ring - is my favourite. In the gloom of a grey early December morning we light a single candle (no baubles for us!) for the prophets, who foretold Jesus' birth.
