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

cisterns - Money saving expert Martin Lewis says that if you have more bedrooms than people in the house you can save money by having a water meter fitted. We have been awash with water recently so perhaps we should start to harvest it instead of buying it. Rainwater harvesting is a must for the new generation of eco houses but the Victorians were doing it and others before them. Some of the older houses in the village have a large brick and mortar lined chamber either under or adjacent to the house. In Alkham I know




of one that is in use and another that was abandoned and filled with all manner of things. Such water holding structures are referred to as cisterns and differ from wells in that they are filled with rainwater from roofs rather than groundwater that fills wells. Cisterns are only a couple of metres deep and lined to keep groundwater out. So why have a cistern if you have a well? The Victorians in hard water areas like Alkham found that doing the laundry in hard water was not as effective as using the soft rainwater and hauling water from the village well was a lot more work than hand pumping from a cistern in the garden. Surprisingly piped water did not arrive in Alkham until just after the Second World War in the late 1940's. If you have saved water and money by having a water meter fitted, your next step is to start rainwater harvesting even if you only use it for watering the garden and digging a 2m deep hole will keep you fit! VILLAGE WELL – A lot of the houses in Alkham had cisterns but the village well in front of the Marquis of Granby was a well as can be seen in the 1930's photo on the left. Parish Council minutes record that there were complaints

about people not covering the well after they got their water. The cisterns, as mentioned above, could be very big with vaulted ceilings for providing water to hospitals and other large buildings and the Old Post Office in Alkham still has one which works when it wants to for watering the garden in dry periods. **Editor**

CHURCHYARD – Susan Lees, who lived in Alkham, was the Parish Clerk from 1982 to 2006 and she did a survey of the churchyard from which she produced a plan of the graves together with the details on the gravestone. As a result, a 13 page A4 booklet has been made which has been left in St. Anthony's church in which the names of the people are listed in alphabetical order together with the details on the memorial. There is a number against each entry and these numbers in sequential order are shown on a plan of the churchyard so that a visitor can find where a grave is. ASIAN HORNET UPDATE - The Dover and District Bee Keeping Association (DDBKA) met at the end of January in the village hall, the meeting was focused on planning for the coming year and how best to tackle the invasive Asian Hornet (AH). The meeting was very well attended and the number of cars trying to park were more than the car parks capacity, so firstly, sorry to anyone who was inconvenienced. We had a talk from a representative from the National Bee Unit (NBU), they have been pivotal in tracking and locating Asian hornets and nests since the sudden increase last year. Last year the NBU located 72 nests in 55 locations, the majority in the South East. Northern France is now heavily populated by AHs and the NBU believe they have travelled over here in cars, lorries, containers, on ferries and some have flown/been blown over. 7 nests were located in the cliffs at Capel. The AHs trapped in Alkham seem to have come from a nest located in Ewell Minnis. As temperatures rise the NBU expect queens will come out of hibernation and start new colonies. February is therefore the time to set spring traps to try and trap these queens before they start laying. There is more guidance this year regarding safety and insurance when dealing with AHs. The British Bee Keeping Association covers its members for monitoring traps, which includes releasing bi catch and replenishing the bait - Trappit. DDBKA have a team of AH team members lead by Jackie Thomas the AH Coordinator. The plan is to try and place a hornet trap at roughly 1km intervals throughout the area and have these monitored by members. Please, if you can, load the free Hornet Watch App onto your phone. It is a very easy and effective way to report sightings, it is also very helpful in identifying the AH versus the slightly larger but native European hornet. The European hornet poses no risk to our bees and other insects and although it looks large and can give a nasty sting it does not need to be reported. You can also report sightings of the AH by completing an online form on the nonnative species.org website. If you have more questions DDBKA have an email address doverasianhornets@btinternet.com.
